Winston-Salem - Odel Martin, dairyman of Rt. 5, Winston-Salem, increased his milk production by 1,113 pounds in 1963 according to G. Van Frye, assistant agricultural extension

"His herd average last year was 8,277 pounds, this year it is 9,390," Frye related. "Martin attributes most of the increase to the Dairy Herd Improvement Association records, quality of feed and amount of grain he fed."
