



Peeler said that the opening of schools was postponed at the request of a number of farmers who said that due to the size of the tobacco crop and to the rate at which it is ripening, the children are needed for the harvest. After consulting with the members of the school board, Peeler said that he called for the postponement.

The principal of the Littleton school and Ed Harvey, a member of the board of education, after making a survey in the Littleton school district, said they found that the harvesting of crops in that area did not justify delay in the opening of the Littleton school.

Peeler said that the countywide teachers meeting, which had previously been scheduled. will not be held. He also said that the bus drivers meeting with the superintendent will not be held.
