TO CLEAN COPPER

Copper shines when cleaned by sprinkling it with salt, then wiping with a paper towel or cloth dipped in vinegar. Or, in place of vinegar, use lemon juice. Rinse the copper immediately and dry with another absorbent cloth. A good homemade copper polish consists of a paste made by mixing equal parts of salt, vinegar and flour. Rub copper with this mixture until it is clean, then wash in hot suds, rinse dry, and polish with a soft cloth. Whether a commercial copper polish or a homemade mixture is used, always wash copper thoroughly with soap suds or it will tarnish again rapidly. Do not polish lacquered ornamental copper, but wash in warm soapy water, rinse and wipe dry with a soft paper towel or cloth.
