**GAS TAX REFUNDS WAITING**

Money in the form of gasoline tax refunds slumbers in the federal and state coffers while awaiting disbursement to Warren county farmers and farmers throughout the Carolinas.

In accordance with the law, farmers may receive a six cents (\$.06) Tax refund from the state and a four cents (\$.04) refund from the Federal Government on each gallon of gasoline used in tractors and other farm equipment.

To receive the refund, you must file an application with both the State and Federal Departments of Internal Revenue by September 30, 1964. If you have not received the proper forms for filing, then stop by your county agent's office and ask for some of these forms.

Fair time is just around the corner. Why not prepare now to enter and exhibit in your local fair? Also, don't forget the State Fair in Raleigh in October.

It is highly desirable that you support your community fair because it will be just as good, or as bad, as the community wishes to make it.

You must have something worth entering in competition with your neighbors and in which you could take pride in showing.

How many times have you visited your fair, stood in front of a fruit, vegetable or flower exhibit and remarked: I have specimens at home better than any I have seen here. And you may be right. The trouble is you won't win any blue ribbons. The same is true for flower arrangements and canned fruits and vegetables.

Before you enter an exhibit be sure to carefully read the catalog instructions for each class, because they guide the judges in making awards. This is especially true if competition is keen. All entries must be properly labeled and entered in the right class.

Strive for perfection. In the flower classes, all entries should have good stems, perfect foliage and perfect blooms. Good condition at the time of judging is essential. This is especially true with cut flowers such as roses.

Vegetables should be true to variety name, of acceptable market size and free of blemishes caused by insects, diseases and bruises. All specimens on a plate or tray of sweetpotatoes should be smooth, of good skin color and uniform. Irish potatoes need not be washed unless you think it will improve the appearance.

Fruits, such as apples, should be true to varietal characteristics, uniform, of good color (in color sorts) and free from blemishes. All specimens on a plate, for example, should be as near the same size as possible with stems attached.

These are a few suggestions which may be helpful in arousing your interest. The important point is to study your catalog and comply with the instructions as outlined.

 1/2 cup brown sugar  
 1/2 cup flour  
 1 teaspoon cinnamon  
 1/2 cup butter

**Man, Woman Disagree Over Govt. Protection**

Do consumers need more protection by the government? Or are private sources—retailers, manufacturers, and their associations—doing an adequate job?

Mrs. Esther Peterson, Special Assistant to the President for Consumer Affairs, sees a need for more federal protection; Robert H. Levi, a Washington retail executive and an officer of a nationwide department store chain, disagrees.

In the current issue of *Change Times*, the *Kiplinger Magazine*, they state their reasons. In a joint interview with Mrs. Peterson, Mr. Levi notes that complaints dealing with service or merchandise represent .0068 of 1 per cent of the transactions of his firm. He estimates that unsatisfactory products made up about 15 per cent of the complaints, and the other 85 per cent are due to human failure—non-delivery,

damaged or wrong merchandise.

But Mrs. Peterson believes that .0068 of 1 per cent is important. "Don't discount it," she told *Change Times*. "And there are the complaints that are never made.... Some products are too small and cheap to complain about; in others, retailers' reputations may be suffering from factors too subtle for customers to complain about."

Mrs. Peterson noted that the government is doing and has done a great deal in consumer protection, and the pressure for such protection has not always come from the government. "Much has come from business which wanted certain ground rules, good competition, and freedom in the market. It has been a part of our whole democratic process. I believe there are 33 departments or agencies that concern themselves with consumer protection and about 22,000 people working in the field."

Mr. Levi pointed out that the Better Business Bureaus are also in the business of protecting the consumer. "We have some 113 bureaus in the United States, and 100,000 business men of their own free will are supplying them with \$10,000,000 a year. These bureaus have 24 pamphlets on

how to shop for various products. Maybe 24 is not enough, maybe they ought to have 48, I don't know. They handled 3,000,000 inquiries and complaints last year."

Since she took office early this year Mrs. Peterson has received complaints on everything from the quality of thread to the servicing of appliances. Labeling and proper testing of consumer goods are areas where there is a great deal of confusion for the buyer, she added. While she does not think labeling is an area that has to be legislated, she indicated that her office will try to see that it is done voluntarily. "I'm very pleased with the kind of changes that are taking place," she stated. "There's no difficulty with firms (who) want to do these things. But it's the fellows who don't comply. Maybe we can help to police some of them. I don't believe that the government should be a mother and take consumers by the hand and go into the marketplace and say, this is good for you and this isn't. I believe too much in the free market and I be-

lieve too much in free choice. But I do think it is the business of government to be sure consumers are informed."

Mr. Levi believes that the more intelligent manufacturers in the United States are already doing a tremendous amount of informing. The great majority—90 per cent or more, the ones that are growing and successful—have one attitude, he noted. "The more they can tell the consumer so she understands exactly what she is getting for her money, the better customer she will be and the better she will like the store.... We want consumer information as long as it does not duplicate what business is already doing—better Business Bureaus, the National Foundation for Consumer Credit and so on—and as long as it does not add costs that are not beneficial to the consumer."
