## **Civil Term** Of Court **Ends Friday**

Damages totaling \$84,229.17 was awarded to claimants seeking damages from Virginia Electric and Power Company in the civil term of Warren County Superior Court which adjourned last Friday afternoon. Court opened on Monday with Judge Leo Carr presiding.

A jury awarded William V. Moseley and wife the sum of 363,479.17, plus interest at 6% per annum from October 19, 1961.

In a second case an award of \$29,750 was given by the jury to Dorothy Kidd Ellis et al. plus interest at 6% per annum from Nov. 16, 1961.

Suit had been brought by the Virginia Power and Light Company against the Moseleys and Ellises to upset awards made by commissioners appointed by the court.

Following the announcement of the awards by the jury, Power Company attorneys made motions that the verdicts be set aside and new trials ordered. Counsel for both the plaintiff and the defendants agreed that the Court might enter judgment upon the motion at a later date out of court and out of the county.

Hearing of the damage suits occupied the major portion of the court's time. In addition to cases reported to noon last. Thursday, the court made the following disposition of other cases:


