Miss Wollett Gives Illustrated Talk At DAR Meeting

Miss Anna Wollett of Littleton, world traveler, was guest speaker last Saturday, November 14, when Mrs. W. A. Graham entertained members of the Warren Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution. Old-fashioned Cochet roses, white sasanquas and chrysanthemums, in shades of pink and red, were used for decorations. The luncheon table was centered with a silver tureen of red roses.

Prior to Miss Wollett's address, a Memorial Service was held for the late Mrs. Norman Cordon of Chapel Hill, past State Regent, and Vice-President General of the National Society DAR, who died recently in a tragic automobile accident. Mrs. J. E. Rooker, Jr., read an "In Memoriam" to Mrs. Cordon -- published in the November DAR magazine -- and prayers were said by Mrs. W. R. Baskerville.
