Growers Are Urged To Vote

Warren County farmers will go to the polls on next Tuesday, December 15, to decide whether or not quotas shall be continued on flue-cured tobacco and cotton.

In addition the growers will determine whether or not assessment shall be levied on peanuts and tobacco for research and sales promotion.

Eligible to vote in the tobacco quota referendum is any person who had a share in the 1964 crop of flue-cured tobacco or its proceeds-as owner, operator, share tenant, or sharecropper-is eligible to vote in the referendum. Also, each person who was either the owner or operator of a farm for which a 1964 tobacco acreage allotment was established is eligible to vote, even though no tobacco was actually produced on the farm in 1964, if an allotment was established for the farm for 1965

W. S. Smiley, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation -County Committee, pointed out yesterday that in this referendum growers will have the choice of approving or disapproving quotas for the next three crops. If at least twothirds of the growers voting approve quotas by voting "yes" quotas will remain in

effect A favorable vote will mean a continuation of the present tobacco program, with penalties on marketing access tobacco, and price supports on the 1965, 1966 and 1967 crops of flue-cured tobacco
