As he talked, the speaker showed colored slides depicting the life cycle of the gladiolus from planting to marketing, which were mute evidence of the hand labor involved. Slides of many other flowers grown in the area were also shown.

Following the program a business session was held when a slate of officers was presented by the nominating committee and unanimously elected. It was also announced that the club would have a bake sale in April at a date to be announced later.
