Electric Forum Set For Vo-Ag Teachers
Vocational agriculture teachers will polish their electrical teaching skills at a farm electrification workshop program at the CP&L district auditorium at Raleigh June 24-25.

The sessions will be presented by Carolina Power & Light Company and the Vocational Agriculture Division of the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction.

Agriculture teachers from Person, Granville, Vance, Franklin, Warren, Wake, Harnett, Johnston, Greene, Wayne, Wilson, Lee and Chatham counties will participate. The sessions will be conducted by W. T. Ellis, district supervisor of vocational agriculture, and Bob Royster, CP&L agricultural development engineer.
