

Warren County is one of 17 counties in North Carolina eligible for participation under the public Works and Economic Development Act of 1965. The purpose of the act is to help communities, areas and

regions in the United States which are suffering from excessive unemployment or underemployment by providing financial and technical assistance needed for the creation of new jobs.

Announcement that Warren County is eligible to share under the act was made at a conference at East Carolina College, Greenville, last week, attended by P. B. Boyd, president of the Citizens Bank of Warrenton and Bill Minette, director of the Warren County Industrial Commission.

Under the act direct grants up to 50 per cent of the cost of needed public works; and supplementary grants to this or other Federal assistance for worthy projects in areas of greatest economic distress up to 80 percent-but in no case may the combined direct and supplementary grants exceed 80
