

Military Company To Attend Camp At Bragg

The special 26 week course was supervised and instructed by the Life Underwriters Training Council (LUTC) and sponsored by the Roanoke Rapids Life Underwriters Association.

Class president Earl Bryant served as master of ceremonies and presented each member with a token gift.

The class consisted of 13 life insurance agents from Halifax, Northampton and Warren Counties.

A gift of appreciation also was given to the class instructor W. T. O'Berry, by the graduating class. O'Berry is district manager for Home Security Life in Roanoke Rapids and has successfully completed both parts I and II of LUTC.

Guests of the class, in addition to their wives, were John Joyner, LUTC chairman for the Roanoke Rapids area, and his wife; and Al Joyner, president of the Roanoke Rapids Life Underwriters Association. Both men made talks on the advantages of LUTC and the important part it plays in the successful underwriter's career.

The LUTC course is composed of 26 weeks of intensive training in classroom, action projects in the field and written tests. It is designed to increase the underwriter's knowledge of his profession

and enable him to better serve the public.

The course is made available to area underwriting personnel through the sponsorship of the Roanoke Rapids Life Underwriters Association.

on all but poorly drained soils. It makes a good turf if fertilized and mowed low and often. Common bermuda makes a satisfactory summer lawn for sunny areas, but Tiflawn and Tifway are much superior.

Tiflawn, formerly known as Tifton 57, is a very aggressive, disease-resistant hybrid bermuda. It is particularly recommended for areas that receive excessive wear, such as lawns, playgrounds and athletic fields.

Tifway is an aggressive disease-resistant dark green hybrid bermuda used for golf fairways. It shows considerable promise as a lawn grass.

Tifgreen is the "Queen" of the hybrid bermudas. It is used extensively for golf greens. But due to its high maintenance requirements, it is not recommended for the average lawn.

Centipede Grass is the lazy man's grass. It creeps along the ground, stays low and requires little mowing. Fertilize it sparingly. Too much nitrogen will kill it.

St. Augustine, which is also called Charleston grass, is especially well-suited for shady lawns near the coast.

Zoysia, is a low, creeping grass that makes a dense beautiful sod. It resembles bermuda, but where adopted, it makes a better lawn than does common bermuda.

Know Your Lawn Grasses

A well-kept lawn is a beautiful sight. And, it can last the year around.

It gives "oomph" to an ordinary house and, as a bonus, prevents erosion and provides a wonderful place for the family to play.

A beautiful lawn doesn't just happen - it takes knowledge and work.

Warm-season grasses (green in summer, brown in winter). . . include bermuda, zoysia, centipede, St. Augustine and carpet grasses. These warm season grasses grow only during frost-free periods. However, they are perennials and new growth will arise from the crowns or underground stems each spring without reseeding.

Bermuda Grass
Common bermuda is often referred to as wire or cane grass, is extremely drought resistant and grows rapidly
