vis Fleming, certificate for  
entire herd averaging over  
450 lbs. butterfat. This herd  
averaged 500 lbs. of butterfat  
per cow and each cow in herd  
averaged 14,106 lbs. milk.  
Fred Newton - awarded plaque  
for having entire herd with  
average milk production per  
cow of 14,414 lbs., also, high  
cow in milk producing 20,750  
lbs. milk, also, high herd  
average of 539 lbs. butterfat  
per cow. Arnold Frank -  
awarded certificate, pen and  
pencil set for 5 years  
continuous top flight service  
as tester for the Association.  
Ernest Brauer - awarded  
plaque for having the most  
improved herd average in milk  
production of 1878 lbs. over  
1965. E. L. Watkins - a-  
warded plaque for highest cow  
in butterfat producing 797  
pounds.

All milk and butterfat pro-  
duction records were made  
during a continuous 305 day  
period. This association is  
composed of outstanding

Extension Service serves as

THE DEADLINE DATE FOR THE PURCHASE  
AND DISPLAY OF LICENSE PLATES IS FEBRUARY 15th.

These Licenses are now on sale at the Mayor's Office. Owners of  
all motor vehicles in the Town of Norlina are required by Ordinance  
to PURCHASE AND DISPLAY a town license plate. Every such  
plate shall be displayed throughout the current year in such a manner  
as to be visible at all times.

For failure to comply with this ordinance a penalty of \$1.00 shall be  
charged. Each day this violation continues to exist, owner shall be  
penalized \$1.00 per day not to exceed \$15.00 or 15 days, thereafter  
court procedure will be entered into.
