An interesting program, which compared the work of American Methodist Women to the work of the British Methodist women, was presented by Mrs. James Knight.

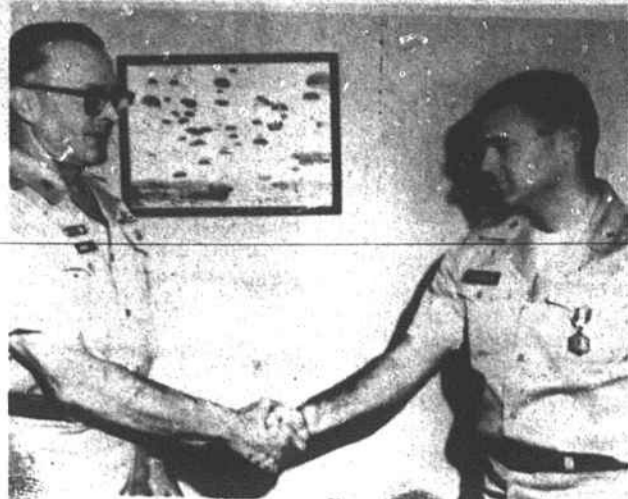
During the social hour, the hostess served a delicious sweet course.
