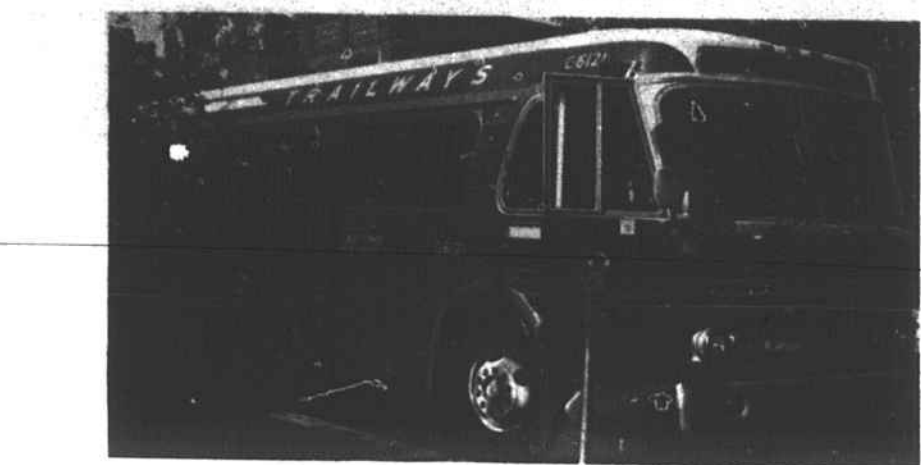

HEADSTART BUS ON RETURN TO WARRENTON

Headstart Children Take Bus Trips

Around 100 HeadStart Children, ages 4 and 5, got their first glimpse of the ocean, the mountains and historical areas last week when they were taken on three bus trips as a part of their educational training. A few older brothers and/or sisters and a few adults, accompanied the children. The Rev. G. E. Cheek, executive director of the Educational Council of Memorial Forest, Inc., under whose direction the Head Start Program is presently being operated, said that many of the children had never been more than 20 miles from their home. In was interesting, he said, to see the expressions on

both the faces of adults and children as they got their first view of the ocean. The first of the extended one-day trips was to Colonial Williamsburg, Va., on June 26 where the children saw the full-scale restoration of the 18th century building and living conditions in what was the capital of Virginia when Washington, Jefferson, Patrick Henry and George Mason were young men. In the 130-acre restored area are more than 500 colonial buildings and 84 acres of gardens and green. The second bus trip was to Blowing Rock, the only town directly on the 500-mile National Parkway—Blue Ridge Parkway. Here the children

saw the town that is on the Eastern Continental Divide at 4,000 feet elevation, and saw auction and art galleries, gift shops, beautiful summer homes and estates and visited the Tweetsie Railroad, where activities make this the most exciting three-mile railroad train ride in America, with its Indian raids, holdups and entertainment in the Tweetsie Palace. The third trip was to Mantoo where the children visited the Fort Raleigh National Historic Site on Roanoke Island where they saw the restored fort built by Sir Walter Raleigh's expeditions—of 1585-1587 were Virginia Dare, first white child was born in 1587. They also visited the Wright Brothers National Memorial, the scene of the first flight by a heavier-than-air motor-propelled airplane by Wilbur and Orville Wright on Dec. 17, 1903. Cheek said that the children thoroughly enjoyed all three trips.

Europeana, a red floribunda; Miss All-American Beauty, a pink hybrid tea; and Scarlet Knight, a scarlet grandiflora, are the All-America Rose Selections for 1968.

Europeana has excellent flower color and form, vigorous plant growth and blooms almost continually throughout the growing season. The plant is low, compact and well-shaped. The flowers are borne in large clusters of clear, satiny red and hold their color well in virtually all kinds of weather. This variety is reported to be especially well adopted for landscaping and bedding. As a cut flower spray, it lasts well when placed in the home.

In addition to winning the All-America award for 1968 it has also won seven other awards, including four gold medals in international competition. Miss All-American Beauty features a vibrant pink color which is reported to be especially attractive and a new shade in pink tones. The flowers are fully double and are of excellent substance. The stems are medium long and sturdy, producing flowers up to five inches across.

The plant has good vigor and grows to a height of approximately four feet under good conditions. In addition to good growth habit and bloom quality, the flowers have a rich, heady tea fragrance.

Scarlet Knight is an eye-catching, velvety scarlet red that does not "blue" as it ages. "The well-shaped buds open from a deep, black-red to blooms of classic high-centered form, four to five inches across and of great brilliance."

The blossoms are usually borne two or three to a stem, with an occasional solitary bloom. It is reported to be a prolific bloomer.

The plant is medium tall with good upright growth habit, attractive bronze-green foli-

age and rugged disease resistance. I have told you many times I am not permitted to give names in this column, but will be glad to put you in touch with a source of plant supply if you will write me. I would suggest that you first check with your local nursery or garden supply center about the availability of plants.

Farmers Urged To Rotate Pastures With Row Crops

The North Carolina farmer who has pastures that have been seeded several years better take a second look before applying topdressing this spring. Pastures are the most productive during the first three or four years. After that, the land should be seeded with another feed crop for one to two years, points out Dr. Carl Blake, extension agronomy specialist at North Carolina State University. Pastures are often thought of as "Permanent," Blake remarks. "Once they are seeded, farmers topdress annually without checking to see if a stand of the same plant or mixture of plants that was originally seeded, is still present." Even for the first few years, these pastures cannot provide an adequate source of high quality feed at all seasons of the year, the specialist explains. Pasture plants such as Ladino clover, fescue or orchardgrass should be considered sod-type crops and should be used in row-crop rotations for maximum production, he adds. Highly productive feed crops such as corn, sorghum, sudangrass, Sudan-sorghum crosses and pearl millet are recommended to help boost the feed supply. Blake says a clover-grass sod contains nitrogen residue and a considerable amount of organic matter which will be useful for the grain crop to be planted later. The organic matter also helps control erosion and prevents water run-off. The grain crop serves as a break in disease and insect cycles. The rotation will allow farmers an opportunity to destroy grass and weeds, and correct lime and fertility deficiencies, according to the specialist. "Another essential advantage to the rotation program is the breaking of the animal parasite cycle." Rather than renovating all pastures at one time, extension agronomy specialists at N. C. State suggest taking about one-fourth of the pasture out of sod each time. Silage crops could be grown on this land to supply feed during seasons when pastures are not growing. By following a renovation program, a good stand of clover and grass could be maintained which will produce the equivalent of about three tons of hay per acre, Blake asserted. "This yield is equal to about 80 to 100 bushels of corn per acre."
