

AN ORDINANCE REGULAT-ING FIREARMS, AIR-RIFLES, SPRING GUNS, AND SIMILAR DEVICES

Be It Ordained By The Board Of Commissioners Of The Town Of Norlina

Section 1. Discharge Prohibited; Exceptions. It shall be unlawful and is hereby prohibited for any person to shoot or discharge within the corporate limits of Norlina any gun or pistol, air rifle, spring gun or pistol, compressed air rifle or pistol, or other similar device which impels with force a shot or pellet of any kind; provided, however, that this section shall not apply to the following:

(a) Law enforcement officers while engaged in the lawful discharge of their dut-

(b) Any person while exercising a legal right to defend his person or property; (c) Any person while engaged in the slaughtering of hogs

or other livestock. Section 2. Confiscation Authorized. The Chief of Police any police officer is hereby authorized to seize and hold, subject to court


