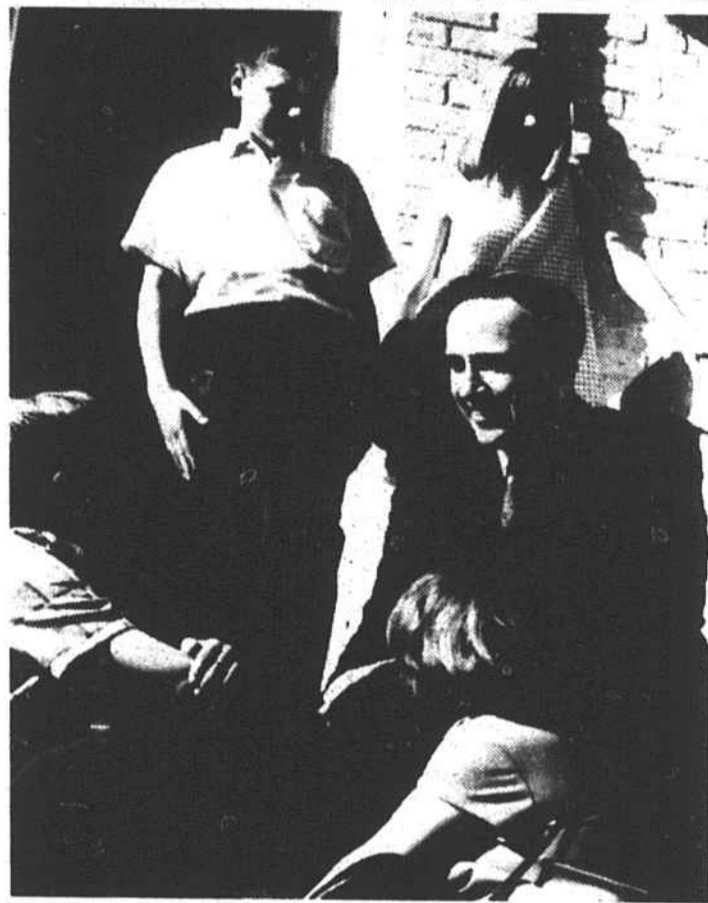

Mrs. Hawkins gave a demonstration on "Using fertilizers to make Artificial Manure". She stated that green plants that decompose quickly are preferred

and placed in the compost pile which should be built about 12 inches in height. If the material is dry it should be sprinkled thoroughly with water and trampled to pack well; add a layer of soil, followed by layers of fertilizer and limestone. To each ten square feet of pile use approximately one pound of ground limestone and 1 1/2 lbs. of nitrogen fertilizer. A mixed fertilizer such as 16-16-8 can be substituted for the separate fertilizer material. Add alternate layers of compost material until the pile is from 4 to 5 ft. high. This can be accomplished if the sides are kept vertical and the top saucer-shaped, the pile should be turned once or twice during the season to hasten decomposition.

The club adjourned to meet with Mrs. L. B. Henderson for its May meeting.

Cheek Funeral Is Held On Thursday

Funeral services for James Stokes Cheek, 62, were conducted on last Thursday at 4 p. m. at the Union Grove Baptist Church by the Rev. Milton A. Galamison, his pastor from Brooklyn, N. Y. Burial was in the Hecks Grove cemetery with military rites conducted by a group from Fort Bragg.
