New License Plates To Go On Sale Here Jan. 2 The new reflectorized green | Post Office on Dec. 18. The and white automobile license plates will go on sale Jan. 2, and surrounding area residents

may obtain plates at the Taylor Building in Warrenton. Office hours will be from 9 a. m. to 1 p. m. and from 2 p. m. to 5 p. m., Monday through Friday, Saturday from 9 a. m. to noon. This will apply only

from Jan. 2 through Feb. 22. The 1968 plates expire Dec. 31 and their use beyond that date is permissible only if they are duly registered by the Department to the vehicle on which display is made. Owners who have their vehicles properly registered by the Department have until Feb. 15 to obtain new plates.

Mrs. Roy P. Robertson, local license agent, points out that to renew license plates one must have a renewal card and cautions against the misplacing of it when it is received. She also asks the applicant to open the envelope, read the instructions and complete the application according to instructions before presenting it for a new plate. This will expedite issuance and keep lines from forming.
