This problem was taken to the commissioners a few years ago by the town commissioners and the county officials agreed to bear part of the cost of maintaining the dump.

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The commissioners said Monday night that debris is being hauled to the Warrenton dump from Macon, Norlina and other sections of the county, and from county buildings in the town, and that under the law the county is supposed to provide a public trash dump for the use of county citizens.

The suggestion was made that the town erect a gate at the entrance to the woods road leading to the dump, but no action was taken pending recommendations of the new street committee appointed by Mayor Miles near the close of the two and one-half hour session.

The crop in this area is expected to be larger this year than last as to poundage, due to carryover from allotments that were not used in 1968 a.s. a result of the drought shortage.


