Navy Captain John D. Brackin, whose wife, Melissa, is the daughter of Viola Taylor of Norlina, is participating in Exercise "Solid Shield '77."

He is serving as an officer assigned to Amphibious Group Two, homebased in Norfolk, Va. His unit is embarked aboard the amphibious command ship USS Mount Whitney for Solid Shield.

The two-week joint exercise is being conducted in the Atlantic coastal waters off North Carolina and Georgia and at nearby military installations. More than 40,000 men and women from all branches of the Armed Forces, including 3,000 Reservists, are participating. Twenty-two ships from the U. S. Second Fleet, plus carrier and land-based Navy and Marine Corps air craft have joined with units of the Army's Forces Command, a Marine Amphibious Brigade and units from the Air Force's Tactical Air Command and Military Airlift Command for "Solid Shield."

Private Johnson Completes Basics

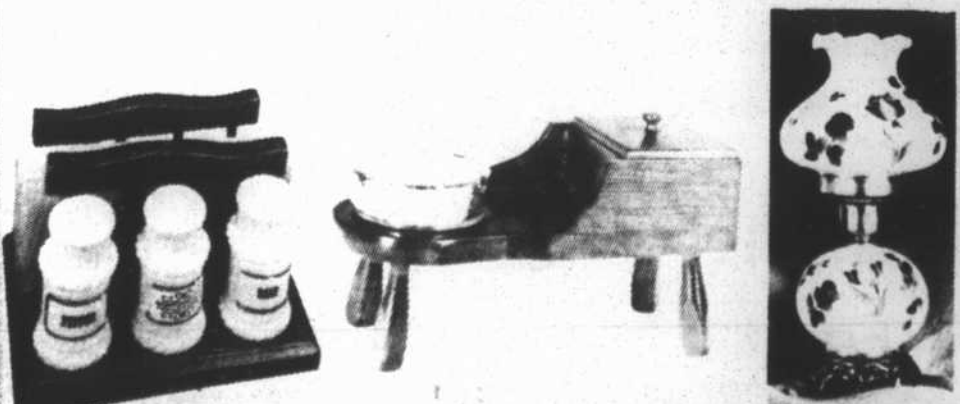
