Campaign funds are used to help support research and care in children's lung-damaging diseases such as asthma with lung damage, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis, childhood emphysema, and cystic fibrosis.

The major symptom of cystic fibrosis is a salty taste of the skin, frequently noticed by parents when kissing their baby. CF is an inherited and incurable disease and can affect not only the lungs but also the digestive system. It is believed that one in 20 persons are carriers of the recessive CF gene. Approximately 60,000 North Carolinians are carriers of this gene.
