annihilated the Lady Waves, 58-28.

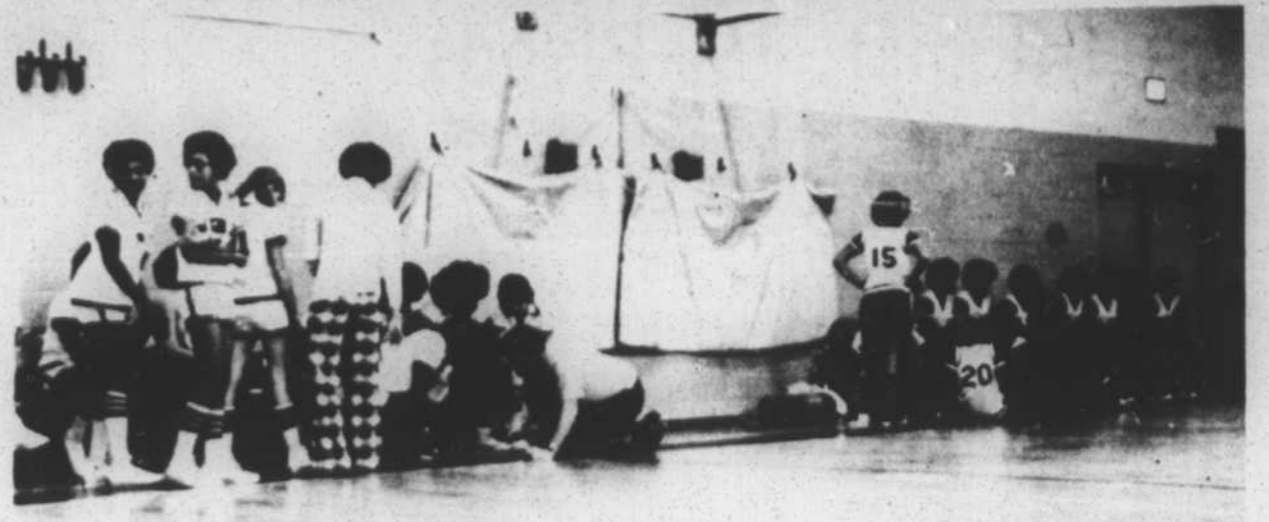
Irene Durham scored 16 points during the game and was again high scorer for the Waves.

Norlina will take on Fuquay at 6:30 on Dec. 29 while John Graham and Millbrook will clash at 8 p. m.

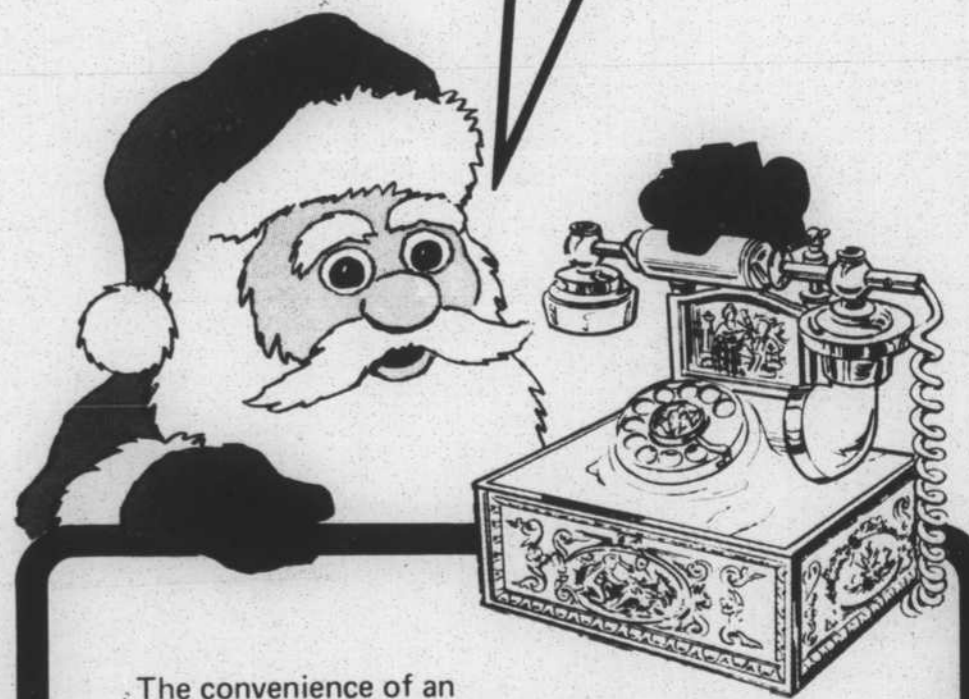
