Emphysema is rapidly increasing. Recently, the Veterans Admin. doubled the number of medical units for treating the disease. One-half of all American men are afflicted in some degree, a V.A. doctor estimates. Emphysema is a clogging and weakening of the tiny air sacs of the lungs. The ability of the lungs to absorb oxygen into the blood is reduced, with shortness of breath and heavy breathing the result. Activity becomes very restricted. Smoking is one cause - air pollution another. Obviously both must be reduced if lung tissue is to remain clean and free to function.
