many ways, the whole community. In addition, a number of public and private agencies will tell what is being done in Warren County about this problem and a panel will discuss, with input from the audience, what else can and should be done.

Dennis Retzlaff, Family Planning Program manager for this area, urges Warren County residents to attend this forum.

"Teenage pregnancy is one of those things that cannot be wished away. Any progress will require the combined action of public and private agencies, churches, local clubs, schools and interested people from all walks of life," he said. "Our future depends on what we do today."

The Teenage Pregnancy Forum is being promoted by a number of agencies including the Warren County School System, Mental Health Program, Department of Social Services, the Health Department and HealthCo.
