## T. W. 1981s Often Fall To Two Wilt Diseases

As more as summer follows spring, wilt diseases will claim a heavy toll of North Carolina garden tomatoes this year. Don't be surprised if it happens to yours.

Wilt diseases are widespread in the state. The agents that cause them are ever-present in the soils of many of the gardens and fields.

North Carolina State University agricultural extension plant pathologists describe the two most prevalent wilt diseases of tomatoes in North Carolina as fusarium wilt and southern bacterial wilt, which is known as Granville wilt on tobacco.

Fusarium is caused by a fungus and bacterial by a bacterium, both of which are soil-borne. The fusarium that infects tomatoes attacks tomatoes only. Bacterial wilt, attacks tobacco, eggplant, pepper and related plants, in addition to tomatoes.

Under favorable growing conditions, tomatoes should bear until first frost. If growing conditions are good but your tomatoes die before the end of the growing season, chances

are very good the reason for their death is one of the wilt diseases.

The most practical measure is to plant tomato varieties that are resistant to the diseases. Two lines developed at NCSU, Venus and Saturn, are resistant to both fusarium and bacterial wilt.


Varieties resistant to common fusarium include Homestead 24, Floradel, Marion, Manalucie, Monte Carlo, Better Boy and Manapal.

It is possible to chemically treat infected soil and grow susceptible varieties on them. A steam treatment of the soil will also give partial control of the wilt diseases.

In any case, a practice of rotating your planting site is a good one to follow. Plant resistant crops such as corn, squash, okra or melons in a rotation with tomatoes to cut down on the level of disease agents in the soil.

There are other diseases of tomatoes, including some other wilts. But if you have sick tomato plants, chances are very good that you have either or both fusarium or southern bacterial wilt.

**SOFT DRINK STAINS**  
Sponge area at once with cool water, then launder in water that's as hot as is safe for the fabric. If stain persists, soak bleachable fabrics for 15 minutes in a solution of one tablespoon chlorine bleach to one quart of water. For non-bleachable fabric, soak 15 minutes in a solution of two tablespoons of 3% hydrogen peroxide to one gallon of water. For very persistent stains, soak area with an enzyme pre-soak solution, then launder.
