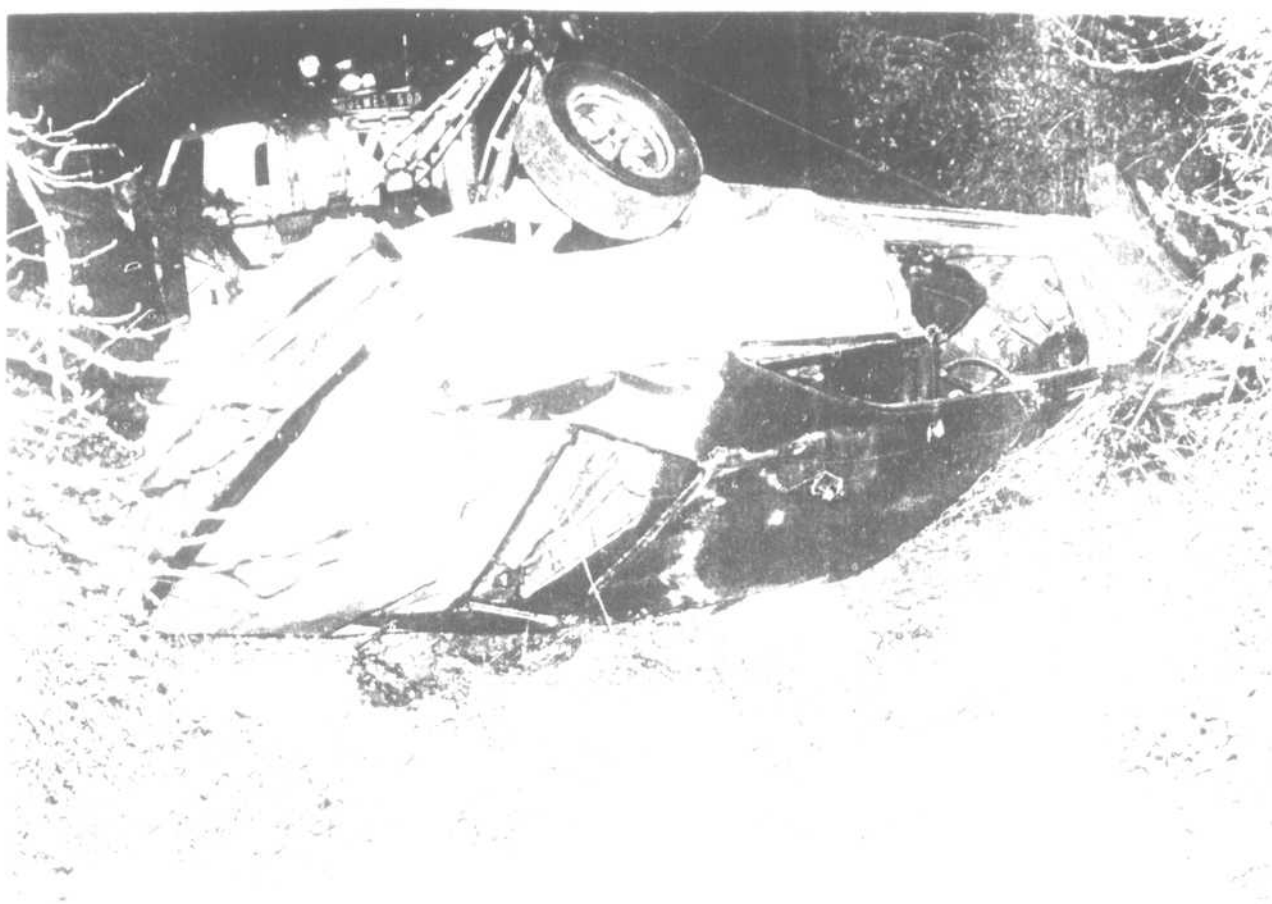


Firemen's Training Scheduled

Burning Trash Responsible For Pair Of Blazes

Burning trash was responsible for two out of the three fires reported Tuesday by the Warren Rural Fire Department. The rural firemen also joined in fighting a trailer fire with the Warrenton town firemen. On Saturday at 7:45 p.m. the rural firemen responded to a grass fire on the farm of Howard King on the old County Home Road near Warrenton. Burning trash was reported to be the cause of this fire which burned over an estimated three acres. Three firemen, with a pumper and brush truck, responded to the call. The fire was extinguished with water. No estimate of the damage was reported. Eleven firemen, with a pumper and two brush trucks, responded to a 10:24 a.m. alarm Monday at the General Williams farm in the Afton-Elberon Community where they used water to extinguish a brush woods and trash fire, started by burning brush around a pond. One acre was estimated to have been burned over, but no estimate of loss was reported. Nine rural firemen, with a pumper, joined forces with Warrenton town firemen when they answered a 12:08 p.m. alarm in response to a trailer fire at the home of Marie Taylor on Haley Street, Warrenton. The cause of the fire was reported as unknown, but the firemen reported a gas stove had been ignited. The flames were extinguished with water. Damage was estimated at \$800.

Norlina Accepts Bids For Project

The Town of Norlina has accepted a bid on its sewage project with completion date within 90 days. Mayor Beverly White told the Warrenton Town Board on Tuesday night according to information he had received. White also said that he had talked with Chairman Jack Harris of the Warren County Commissioners regarding the cost of operating the town's waste water treatment plant and that while the county commissioners had made no definite decision, they would probably have to subsidize the plant until such time as the Norlina project is completed. White said he understands that April 19 is the tentative completion date for the Warrenton Waste Water Treatment Plant, and that without some help he does not see how the town can operate without funds for treating Norlina sewage. One Of Warren County's 'Volunteers'

The face of Maggie Carrington is a familiar sight around Mariam Boyd Elementary School. Her great-granddaughter, Tara Denise Chang, is a first grader at the school, and not even Mrs. Carrington's 75 years stop her from being one of the most involved "parents" in the school. Not one to boast about her participation in the programs of the school, Mrs. Carrington said in her slow, unassuming manner, "Well, I do try to attend PTA meetings, and I go on trips with the children when I can, and whenever there's a workshop I try to be there. I just think when little ones are involved, we ought to know what's going on." Mrs. Carrington, who lives on West Franklin Street in Warrenton, is not deterred by the fact that she has to walk everywhere she goes. Mrs. Barbara Talley, Tara's teacher, recalls that last winter when sleet and ice covered the ground, Mrs. Carrington still walked with Tara to school. "She always responds when we send out a call for help," Mrs. Talley said. "Whenever I need assistance in the classroom, I know I can count on her. And she never misses a PTA meeting." Mrs. Carrington also brings some talents to the school that few parents can boast. For the Halloween carnival last October, Mrs. Carrington made soap. She calls it the instant kind, made from hot, lye and water and requiring only about 30 minutes of stirring over heat. "One of the mothers told me she used hers for washing dishes," Mrs. Carrington said. "Now, I wouldn't use it for that, but I guess it's OK." A widow, Mrs. Carrington has raised Tara since the child was three months old. "She's a full-time job, but I also help people in the neighborhood who need me," she said. "I cook, clean and tend the sick." But at night, you are likely to find Mrs. Carrington with Tara, writing, drawing, reading and working on school projects. Tara gets her lessons first thing when she gets home from school. I help if I can, but sometimes the boy across the street helps." Mrs. Carrington is concerned about parental involvement in the schools. "We had a workshop recently and two ladies got off from work to come," she said. "That was good. But I think the ladies who don't work could get more involved." Mrs. Carrington is one of the best examples the Community Schools Program has of giving those valuable, often untapped, resources of time and talent. "She doesn't find it tiresome raising a seven-year-old. I enjoy it. I just wish the Lord would enable me to do more."

In Warren Court Milam Given Eight Years

Warrenton, Ore. (AP)—A federal judge today sentenced a man to eight years in prison for a 1964 kidnapping of a young girl in Warren County. The man, James Earl Ray, was found guilty of the crime by a federal jury in Warrenton. The girl, who was 11 years old at the time, was held captive for several months before being rescued. Ray is being held in the Warren County Jail. He is expected to serve his sentence at the Federal Reformatory for Women in Alderson, West Virginia. The judge, U.S. District Court Judge W. C. Palmer, said that Ray's actions were "heinous and depraved." He also noted that Ray had a long history of criminal activity, including several previous kidnappings and robberies. Ray was arrested in Warrenton in 1967. He had been on the FBI's wanted list for several years. The girl was rescued in 1965. She is now living with her family in Warrenton. She is in good health and is attending school. The case has attracted national attention because of the length of Ray's sentence and the fact that he was a well-known criminal.

Registration Set For Local Pupils

Preschool registration will be held in four Warren County Schools April 19-20. Those schools hosting the registration are Vaughn, Mariam Boyd, Northside and South Warren. All parents who have children who will be five years old on or before October 31 are encouraged to register their children for kindergarten. Parents are required to present birth certificates and immunization records for children. The immunization records should include three DTP shots (diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis), three doses of OPV (oral polio vaccine), one rubella shot after 12 months, and one rubella shot. The schedule for the registration is Vaughn, April 20; South Warren, April 22; Northside and Mariam Boyd, April 23.
