

Dispositions From Two Days Of Superior Court Listed

Judge Giles R. Clark presided over Warren County Superior Court last week disposing of the following cases during sessions on Tuesday and Wednesday:

Richard Douglas Griffin, charged with breaking and entering, larceny, and possession, motion to continue through counsel denied, called and failed, order for arrest and order for forfeiture issued, bond set at \$10,000 secured.

James Russell Fuller, found not guilty by a jury of 12 to a charge of assault with a deadly weapon inflicting serious injury.

Robert Lee Alston, guilty of assault with a deadly weapon, ordered confined in the N. C.

Department of Correction for 18 months. Court recommended work release provided he shall make restitution to the victim, John B. Alston, in the amount of \$1,705.15. Amended in order for him to serve sentence in Warren County Jail so long as he abides by all rules and regulations and orders of the sheriff.

Jerry Wayne Jones, charged with breaking and entering and larceny, called and failed, order for arrest and order for forfeiture issued. Bond set at \$2,000.

Larry Townes, charge of preparation to commit burglary dismissed by district attorney. Townes was found guilty to charge of felonious

breaking and entering and ordered confined in the N. C. Department of Correction for three years, suspended for three years with special supervised probation for three years under usual terms and conditions and following special conditions: Serve an active term of six months in the N. C. Department of Correction, (court recommended work release privileges during this term) and pay the regular probation supervision fee of \$10 per month. Sentence to commence at 5 p. m. on Friday, Feb. 17. Defendant to report to sheriff of Warren County and surrender himself at that time for service of this sentence.

Ernestine Reed, found guilty of assault by pointing a gun, ordered confined in Warren County Jail for six months, suspended for two years with unsupervised probation for two years under usual conditions and following special conditions: that she pay \$100 fine and costs, remain of good behavior and not violate any laws of this state during period of suspension and not go upon lands of prosecuting witness, not have in her possession any type of firearm.

Ervin Dennis Hargrove, charged with possession of stolen firearm, called and failed, order for arrest and order of forfeiture issued, bond set at \$1,000.

Harry Lee Johnson, guilty of possession of stolen automobile, ordered confined in N. C. Department of Correction for a period of one year.

James Benjamin Jones, guilty of possession of Schedule VI controlled substance with intent to sell, ordered confined in N. C. Department of Correction for two years,

suspended for three years, supervised probation for three years under usual conditions and following special conditions: Pay \$300 fine, costs, and submit to warrantless searches by probation officer of his person, vehicle, or premises; not use, possess or control any illegal drug or controlled substance unless prescribed for him by licensed physician and not associate with any person known or previously convicted of being users, possessors, or sellers and not frequent places where such illegal drugs or controlled substances are sold, kept or used.

Calvin Hargrove, guilty of possession of Schedule VI controlled substance marijuana; ordered to pay fine of \$50 and costs of court.

Sam Alston, guilty of simple possession of Schedule VI controlled substance marijuana; ordered to pay a \$50 fine and court costs.

John Banks, guilty to simple possession of Schedule VI controlled substance marijuana, ordered to pay a fine of \$50 and court costs.

Michael Debnam, guilty to possession of Schedule VI controlled substance marijuana with intent to sell, ordered confined in N. C. Department of Correction for two years, suspended for two years, with supervised probation under usual conditions and following special conditions: Pay \$200 fine and costs of court, submit to warrantless searches by probation officer of his person, vehicle or premises; not use, possess or control any illegal drug or controlled substance unless prescribed for him by licensed physician and not associate with any person known or previously convicted of being users, possessors, or sellers and not frequent places where such illegal drugs or controlled substances are sold, kept or used. A charge of maintaining a dwelling for purpose of keeping and selling a controlled substance was dismissed by the prosecutor.

Michael Debnam, guilty to possession of Schedule VI controlled substance marijuana with intent to sell, ordered confined in N. C. Department of Correction for two years, suspended for two years, with supervised probation under usual conditions and following special conditions: Pay \$200 fine and costs of court, submit to warrantless searches by probation officer of his person, vehicle or premises; not use, possess or control any illegal drug or controlled substance unless prescribed for him by licensed physician and not associate with any person known or previously convicted of being users, possessors, or sellers and not frequent places where such illegal drugs or controlled substances are sold, kept or used. A charge of maintaining a dwelling for purpose of keeping and selling a controlled substance was dismissed by the prosecutor.

Allan Burwell Moss, aka Kenneth, guilty of possession of a Schedule VI controlled substance marijuana with intent to sell, ordered confined in the N. C. Department of Correction for two years, suspended for three years, supervised

charge of maintaining a dwelling for purpose of keeping and selling a controlled substance, dismissed by prosecutor.

Alfred Hymon, aka Head Hymon, guilty of possession of Schedule VI controlled substance marijuana, ordered to pay a fine of \$50 and court costs. A charge of possession of marijuana with intent to sell and deliver, and of selling and delivering marijuana was dismissed by the prosecutor.

Freeman Robere Johnson, guilty of possession of Schedule VI controlled substance marijuana for purpose of sale, ordered confined in N. C. Department of Correction for two years, suspended for three years, supervised probation for three years under usual terms and following special conditions: Pay \$250 fine and costs in each case, pay \$10 restitution to Warren County Sheriff's Department, submit to warrantless searches by probation officer of his person, vehicle, or premises, not use, possess or control any illegal drug or controlled substance unless prescribed for him by licensed physician and not associate with any person known or previously convicted of being users, possessors or sellers and not frequent places where such illegal drugs or controlled substances are sold, kept or used. A charge of maintaining a vehicle for the purpose of keeping and selling a controlled substance was combined for judgment with the previous case, and a charge of possession of marijuana with intent to sell and deliver was dismissed by the prosecutor.

Selwyn Alston, guilty to eight counts of worthless checks all of which were combined for judgment; ordered confined in the Warren County Jail for a term of 30 days. The court also found that the defendant had willfully and without just cause violated the conditions of a suspended sentence and ordered the suspended sentence revoked and an active sentence of not less than 15 nor more than 30 days invoked. The court also found the defendant willfully and without

probation for three years under the usual terms of probation and following special conditions that he pay a \$250 fine, costs in each case, submit to warrantless searches by probation officer of his person, vehicle, or premises; not use, possess or control any illegal drug or controlled substance unless prescribed for him by a licensed physician and not associate with any person known or previously convicted of being users, possessors, or sellers and not frequent places where such illegal drugs or controlled substances are sold, kept or used. A charge of possession of drug paraphernalia was combined with the previous case for judgment. Charges of possession of marijuana with intent to sell and deliver, and selling and delivering marijuana; maintaining a vehicle for the purpose of keeping and selling a controlled substance; manufacture of a controlled substance marijuana; and possession of a controlled substance marijuana were dismissed by the prosecutor.

just cause in violation of terms of probation in five other cases and ordered the suspensions revoked and active sentences to begin.

Orlando Satterwhite, charge of nonsupport of children, dismissed.

Hazel Lockemy, charge of littering, called and failed, order of forfeiture and order for arrest issued, bond set at \$200.

Gloria Williams, charge of operating business after hours dismissed by the prosecutor.

On the probation docket, termination orders were issued on the mandatory reviews of Mansfield Cheyenne Russell, Glenn Barwell Harris, Jr., and George

Burnette. On the appearance docket, the case of Willie Branch was ordered continued until the defendant is served with the order of arrest.

Willie Louis Cooke, court found that the defendant's failure to attend Alcohol and Drug Education Traffic School and failure to pay tuition was not willful and that he did not have transportation nor means with which to pay. Ordered that he comply on or before April 1, 1984.

The disposition of several cases heard later in the week was not available at presstime and will be published in next week's issue of The Warren Record.

Book Delivery Begins Locally

Delivery of Carolina Telephone's new telephone directory for the Henderson, Oxford, Louisville, Centerville, Franklinton, Warrenton, Norlina and Wake Forest exchanges has begun, according to Richard R. Barnes, Jr., district commercial and marketing manager for the company.

"Customers who do not receive their new phone book by March 1 should call the telephone company business office.

"Our new telephone directory cover salutes the commemoration of the 400th anniversary of the first English colonies at Roanoke Island," said Barnes.

Barnes said that the map on the back cover, showing the chain of sandbanks known as the Outer Banks, is based on a watercolor by famed colonist and artist John White, painted in the 1580's. Other sketches are from the Elizabethan Gardens near Manteo, the ship Elizabeth II under construction, an Indian Village based on the detailed drawings of John White, and a scene from The Lost Colony, the outdoor drama at Manteo.

Tighten Up Home For Lower Bills

Insulation and storm windows and doors pay for themselves in lowered energy costs. But since renters pay energy costs, landlords often feel it is not worth the expense to make property energy efficient.

If your apartment or rented house falls into this category, there are still several low-cost measures you can take to lower your bills, says Sandra Dellinger, extension housing specialist, North Carolina State University.

The major goal is to keep warm air in and cold air out. Weather-strip and caulk around doors, windows and plumbing and duct work.

Cracks under doors cause a tremendous heat loss and are also simple to stop. Sew up a draft stopper. This is a long, snake-like piece of

fabric filled with sand and placed in front of the door. You can get instructions on making a draft stopper from your local county agricultural extension office.

If curtains sway in the breeze on windy nights, your apartment probably doesn't have storm windows. Put in plastic on the inside or outside of the window, taking care not to damage the walls or windows. Masking or duct tape will hold the plastic in place on the inside. Nicks or nails will leave air leaks.

Sheets of acrylic can also be purchased, cut to size and held tightly in place with magnetic strips. This is a more expensive option, but the windows can be taken with you to a new home or apartment. Acrylic is also clearer than plastic.
