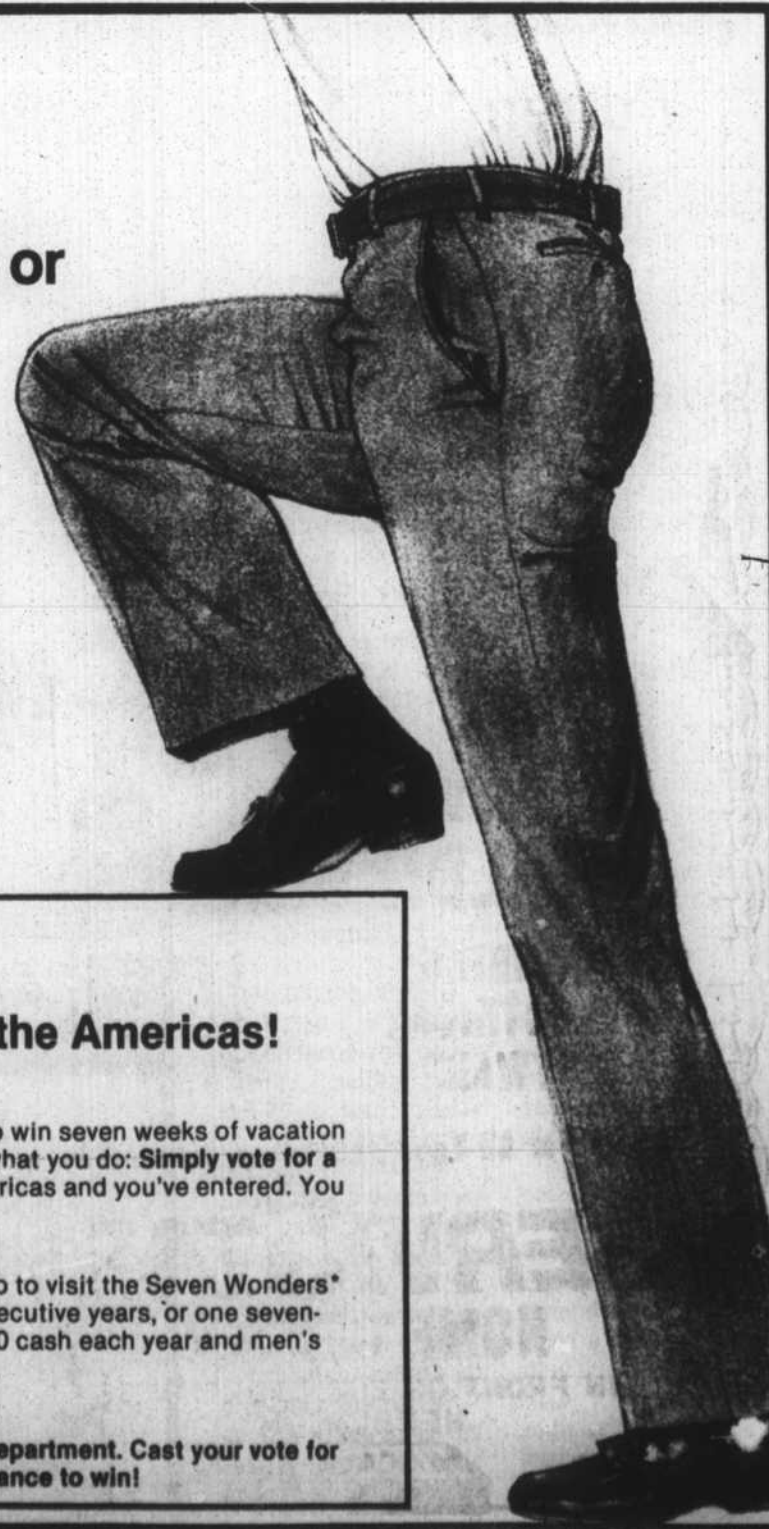
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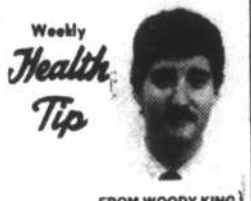

HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE (Part 3)

There are three types of diners: those who never add salt to food; those who taste their food, then add salt if 'needed'; and those who shake salt on their food without even tasting it. After researching large numbers of each type for several years, a doctor has now found that high blood pressure develops 10 times more often among heavy salt users than among those who never salt their food. Salt is also involved in kidney disorders, obesity, and other ailments.

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
