Although Brooks came in first throughout the state, Warren County Democrats cast 2,419 votes for challenger Barnes and 2,139 for Brooks. (A third candidate, Donald G. Wiseman of Cary, garnered 346 votes in Warren).

Republicans in Warren had no clear-cut favorite among five Republicans who sought their party's nomination for lieutenant governor last May, but will Tuesday choose between newcomers John Carrington and Franklin (Frank) Jordan for the state's number two post.
