Stir Fry Vegetables and Chicken

4 cups shredded cabbage small onion, thinly sliced green pepper, thinly sliced

in strips 1 large, firm tomato, cut into thin wedges

2 cups broccoli flowerets, in small pieces

3 tablespoons oil 2 teaspoons sugar 1 cup cooked cubed chicken

Salt and pepper to taste

Prepare vegetables. Sprinkle cabbage with sugar, salt and pepper and toss lightly. Heat oil in skillet; add vegetables in this order: saute onions, add green pepper, cab-bage and broccoli. Toss together. Add tomatoes and toss. Add chicken. Cover and cook 2 to 3 minutes over medium heat. Yields 6 serv-
