## THOUGHT FOR FOOD

Chewy Cheddar Cut-Ups  
Preheat oven to 375°. Grease 15" x 10" pan. In large mixer bowl, cream: 1 cup margarine. Add and blend well: 2 cups grated cheddar cheese. Add and mix well: 2 cups sifted flour. Divide mixture in half, press each into balls and chill. Combine and cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens: 2 cups cut-up dates, 1 cup finely-chopped peeled apple, ½ cup Sugar Twin, ¼ cup water.

Set aside to cool. Meanwhile, pat out one portion of dough to cover bottom of pan. Spread filling evenly over dough. Roll out other portion of dough to 1/8" thickness. Cut into ½ inch wide strips. Crisscross strips on top of filling. Bake for 25-30 minutes. Cool on wire rack. Cut into 1½ inch squares. Yield: 60 squares.

**know your Carpeting**

**WHEN YOU BUY CARPET**

When you decide on the carpet you need, there are five important questions that you should consider before making your purchase. One, will the carpet be in a heavily traveled area, or will it be placed in an area such as the living room where there is a great deal less usage? Certain carpets are made for constant wear, whereas others are less durable.

Two, will there be direct light, or indirect light on the carpet? Direct light is best with patterned designs that diffuse the light into shadings, whereas indirect light is best with strong color, generally solids, for a more continuous effect.

Three and four, will the emphasis of the room be on the carpet or the furniture, and also, will the draperies and wallpaper be patterned, or solid colors? Your carpet must blend with the decor of the room. It must either enhance or dominate, depending upon whether it is a background or a focal point of the room.
