Bronze Star Comes 40 Years Late

Forty years ago, Claude J. Smith of Warrenton was notified that he had been awarded a Bronze Star for his service in the U.S. Army in the European-African-Middle Eastern Theatre of Operations during World War II. This past September, Smith finally received the medal, along with a commendation from President Reagan for "meritorious achievement in combat against an armed enemy." According to Smith, a friend who prefers to remain anonymous recently decided the time had come for Smith to get the military decorations he deserved and undertook the task of greasing the wheels of government bureaucracy. Smith, shown here with the Bronze Star and other medals of commendation, said this week that he served 310 days on the front lines and never got a scratch. "I got my medals," Smith said with a smile, "and that's all I want." Smith, a Henderson native, served in the Army from 1943-45. 
