

Volunteer Work In Central America Discussed By Pair

New Officers Are Elected By Drewry Women

Members of the Missionary League of St. Paul's Lutheran Church and guests of other denominations were told recently of the beneficent experiences of two ladies who volunteered for temporary work in the mission field in Costa Rica June, 1985.

After Pastor Rathjen presented an invocation and Mrs. Annie Bender, president of the League, welcomed members and guests, Mrs. Nancy Finch and Mrs. Connie Atkinson told the group of their experiences in Costa Rica.

They said they had contacted the minister of Franklinton Methodist Church and requested to join a work team in the mission field for about one month during the summer of 1985. They were ac-

cepted and after attending orientation meetings, they left for Cuidaa, Cortez in the southern part of Costa Rica.

As they arrived they were joined by two other mission workers and immediately began their work with women of Cortez to organize a summer camp for over 75 children.

They also renovated an old parsonage as a dormitory for students who were in need of housing, without which they would have been unable to attend high school.

The enthusiasm of these two ladies and others was the impetus for the members of the little community of Cuida to become involved, stay involved and, after the Americans left, to keep the project they had started, using the tools and funds left for them.

In closing, Mrs. Finch stated, "I received much more from the people of Cortez than I could possibly have done for them. We are, indeed, all God's children."

Mrs. Tillie Daeke, hostess and sister of Mrs. Atkinson, served refreshments during the social hour.
