WALKER'S LINE
of Four Horse Post Coaches,
Running from Greensborough, N. C., by Salem, to Wythe Court-House, Va., three times a week and back.



THIS line starts from Greensborough every Monday, Wednesday and Saturday, at 2 o'clock A. M., and arrives at Salem same days at 8 o'clock, A. M. Leaves Salem every Monday, Wednesday and Friday, at 9 o'clock, A. M., and arrives at Wythe Court House every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, at 4 o'clock, P. M., in time to correspond with the great lines leading through the Valley of Virginia, to Knoxville, Nashville, &c. in Tennessee.

Leaves Wythe Court-House every Monday, Wednesday and Friday, at 7 o'clock, A. M. and arrives at Salem every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, by 4 o'clock, P. M., and at Greensborough same evenings at 10 o'clock.

It is so arranged as to correspond in its arrivals at Greensborough with the departure of the following stages, viz: The line to Raleigh, N. C., to Danville and Fredericksburg, Va., and to the Petersburg Railroad. By this line passengers can be assured to arrive at Knoxville, Tenn. in four and a half days from Greensborough.

A stage is also run, by the subscriber, from Salem to Lexington, N. C., three times a week, to correspond with the arrivals and departures of the great Northern and Southern Line of Stages, Peck & Wellford contractors, at Lexington. The coaches, made at Troy, N. Y. are good and comfortable, the drivers are careful and attentive, the teams excellent, and the fare low, only \$8 from Greensborough to Wythe C. H.; and from Lexington, N. C. to Wythe C. H. \$7 50; from Greensborough to Salem, 28 miles, \$2; from Lexington to Salem, 21 miles, \$1 50; from Salem to Wythe C. H. 92 miles, \$6 00. Way passengers 7 cents a mile.
