### FAMOUS CASES BEFORE U. S. SUPREME COURT

WASHINGTON, April 2.—The Supreme Court of the United States today began the hearing of the appeal of Senator Joseph Ralph Burton, of Kansas, from the judgment of the Federal Court at St. Louis, Mo., convicting him of accepting retainers in cases pending before the department. The early hearing of the appeal was decided on because the State and the people of Kansas were being deprived of full representation in the Senate. Mr. Burton has taken no part in the Senate deliberations since he was expelled two years ago. Another case, the hearing of which will probably be taken up today or tomorrow, is that of Robert Sawyer and Arthur Adams, two negro seamen on the steamer Berwin, who, with another negro by the name of Scott, killed the captain, mate, engineer and the cook of the vessel, all white men, off Hatteras, last fall, and threw their bodies overboard. All three were sentenced to be hanged by the Federal Court at North Carolina, and Sawyer and Adams appealed to the United States Supreme Court. The action of the United States Supreme Court in the matter of the negro Ed Johnson, who was lynched at Chattanooga, Tenn., after an appeal had been granted to him by the United States Supreme Court, is awaited with considerable interest. As Johnson is dead the hearing of the appeal would naturally be negative and had he died a natural death that would have settled the matter. In this case, however, the death was not natural, but, in a certain measure, involves a case of contempt of the Supreme Court. It is well informed circles it is believed that nothing will be done in the matter so far as the Supreme Court is concerned, beyond taking formal cognizance of the appellant's death.

### REPAIRS TO BE MADE ON MANY BATTLESHIPS

By Wire to The Sentinel. BROOKLYN, April 2.—Considerable work is booked for the navy yard in this city for May and June. The program of repairs and docking of vessels of the Atlantic fleet is now before the Secretary of the Navy, who will probably approve of the scheme. It is intended to have the ships sent to the navy yards by the middle of May. The Alabama will go to Brooklyn Navy yard, the Illinois to Boston and the Iowa to Norfolk, and upon each of these ships work will be authorized to an extent of \$15,000. The Indiana will be sent to Brooklyn for some minor work. The Maine, the Kentucky and the Kearsarge will be docked here, and the Missouri at Boston, and later the Kentucky will be surveyed at Norfolk and the Kearsarge at League Island to ascertain the extent and character of repairs which will be applied in the fall. The vessels of the coast squadron, the monitors, the Denver, the Des Moines and the Cleveland, will be fitted up for the midshipmen's practice cruise. The Texas will probably come here for docking and to receive some minor repairs reported as necessary. The armored cruisers will also be sent here, one at a time, at intervals of two or three weeks, to receive attention required to complete the installation of those ships, such as the fitting of the automatic shutters of the turrets. Some of the destroyers will go to Norfolk and the rest to League Island, and all of the smaller vessels will be sent to the former yard.
