NOTED DESPERADO CAUGHT.

Revenue Officers Capture a Big "Moon shiner" in Caswell County.

504 Madlock, a noted moonshiner and desperado of Caswell county, who has been for the past six months or more a fugitive from justice, was captured Saturday night at his home near Milton by three United States officers, and carried to jail at Reidsville, from which he last escaped.

The Danville Register says: Some time ago it will be remembered that a party of officers caught Madlock at his home after a desperate struggle during which a volley of shots were fired. While being conveyed to Reidsville in a baggy and with the handcuffs on him Madlock grabbed a pistol from one of his captors, and attempted to shoot him. Had it not been for the immediate interference of another officer a tragedy might have resulted. Madlock was given a preliminary hearing and lodged in the jail at Reidsville, but escaped after being confined only a short time.

Since that time he has defied the officers of the law, and it was learned that he had returned to his old home near Milton.
