**THREE EDUCATIONAL  
MEETINGS IN ALABAMA**

BIRMINGHAM Ala., April 12.—Three important meetings of educators of this state will begin here this afternoon and the hotels are crowded with teachers, superintendents, principals and others interested in educational matters, who have come here to attend these conventions. The three conventions are the twenty-fifth annual meeting of the Alabama Educational Association, the eighth annual session of the county superintendents' association and the second annual session of the town and city superintendents' association.

The convention of the Alabama Educational Association will open at half past three this afternoon. Mayor George B. Ward, of Birmingham, will deliver an address of welcome, to which President C. C. Thach of the Alabama Polytechnical Institute will respond. President W. C. Striplin, of Gadsden, will deliver his annual address. The rest of the afternoon session will be devoted to routine business. At the evening session Donald J. H. Pecunian will deliver an address. There will be three sessions tomorrow and the convention will come to a close on Saturday forenoon. The county superintendents will hold a separate meeting this afternoon to listen to addresses by some of the prominent members. The department of city superintendents will also hold a meeting this afternoon, which will be devoted principally to addresses on various educational subjects.

**WILL PLACE ROSES ON GRAVES.**

Winston-Salem Typographical Union to Place Beautiful Bouquets on the Last Resting Place of John Henry Borer and Walter White, Formerly Members of Washington City Union.
