SUIT FOR \$30,000 IS BEGUN TODAY

Puryear, was taken up in Davidson superior court here today. The plaintiff is suing for damages in the amount of \$30,000 on account of the death of her husband.

NEWS ITEMS REPORTED FROM RALEIGH TODAY.

Special to The Sentinel. RALEIGH, April 25.—Fifteen cases were disposed of last evening by the supreme court, opinions being handed down in eleven and four others being affirmed per curiam. Probably the case of most public interest was State vs. Martin from Forsyth, in which Reed Martin was convicted of throwing a bomb into a street car at Winston-Salem.

The question involved in the appeal was whether or not street cars are real or personal property. Counsel for the defendant, J. S. Grogan, argued that street cars are not personal property so that the prosecution could not, as it was in this case, be under 3676 of the Code Revisal. In an elaborate opinion by Associate Justice Walker the supreme court holds that the cars are personal property so as to render a lawful and wanted injury to them criminal under section 3676 of the Revisal, but that the indictment is not sufficient to sustain conviction at common law for malicious mischief as contended by the State.
