MERCHANTS HAD GOOD TRADE.

Stores Have Been Thronged With Purchasers Throughout the Day and The Trade Tonight Promises to be Good—Country People had Much Produce on the Market.

Saturday was a busy day with the merchants of the city. The trade has been good in all lines, especially in the department stores and clothing emporiums. Several of the merchants had advertised special bargains for the day and these stores were crowded all day long.

A majority of the manufacturing plants of the Twin-City have pay-days weekly, though some of them pay off bi-weekly. This of course makes a good trade for Saturday and when it is remembered that the manufacturing plants of this city employ some eight thousand or more men and women it can readily be seen that a large amount of cash changes hands here on Saturday.

Then, too, there was a large trade from the country and near-by towns here Saturday. Incoming trains brought purchasers here and this trade is much sought after by the merchants, as it is always strictly cash. The country trade was very heavy considering the time of the year when the farmers are so busy getting their crops in the ground.

The warehouses and Trade street were thronged with wagons, many of them loaded with country produce. It is too soon for most vegetables, but onions are plentiful and there were wagon-loads of this vegetable offered for sale. Fry-sized chickens and old hens, eggs and butter, milk and, in fact, everything that can be produced on the farm at this season of the year were everywhere in evidence and there were numerous purchasers. A wagon-load of fry-sized chickens here today is worth a dozen loads of wool, the prevailing price for young chickens being 30c and 35c.

There was wagon-loads of hay and wood on the market as usual, though the demand for these staples was not heavy.

Very little tobacco was offered on the warehouse floors, most of that sold having been shipped here by rail.

BUILDING NOTES.

Much Progress Was Made on the Buildings in Course of Construction Here During the Past Week.

The weather having been very favorable during the past week, the contractors have made much progress on the buildings now in course of construction here. Several new buildings have been started, notably the new Piedmont warehouse on Trade street.

The walls of the new hotel have been completed and roof will be put on during the next few weeks. This building is one of the highest in the city and is plainly visible from Southside, Fairview and other suburbs.

Among some of the buildings which are now undergoing repairs are the old Ziglar building on Trade street which is being remodeled for the Huntley-Hill-Stockton Company; the Tise building on Main street, to be occupied by a new firm; the Montague building, on Main street, which is being enlarged for offices, and several other business blocks.

The work of excavating for the new building to be erected on Fourth street by Mrs. Masten and Mrs. Ogden, has been begun. This building will add much to the beauty of the city and will be a handsome structure when completed.

The inside work on the new Reeder and Tise buildings is nearing completion and they will be ready for occupancy in the near future.

The large new power plant of the Fries Manufacturing and Power Company has begun operation and is now supplying the power for the Southside cotton mills.

The new ice plant of the Thomas & Co., in Salem, has been completed and the machinery is now being placed. The plant has a capacity of twenty tons daily.

The erection of several new buildings in the near future is now assured, among the number being two store buildings—one on Main, the other on Fifth street. These buildings are to be erected by Messrs. A. H. Eller, of this city, and H. G. Chatham, of Elkin.

The work of grading the South-bound Railroad is being pushed and it is said that contracts for other sections are to be awarded within a few weeks.

A FAVORABLE REPORT.

House Committee on Agriculture Endorses Proposed Forest Reserve in Western Carolina—Governor R. B. Glenn and Mr. H. E. Fries, of This City, Have Taken Active Part in the Matter.

The news that the House committee on agriculture had unanimously reported favorably on the bill for the establishment of a forest reserve in Western Carolina, was received here with many expressions of approval. The Senate committee had previously reported the bill favorably and there are now good reasons to believe that the bill will pass Congress at this session. The bill provides for the expenditure of three million dollars for the proposed forest reserve. Mr. H. E. Fries, of this city, was a member of the committee that appeared before the House committee some weeks ago and urged a favorable report. Governor R. B. Glenn has also taken an active interest in the measure.

CITY DOING MUCH PAVING.

The Work is of the Permanent Variety and is Badly Needed—Sidewalk Paving Also Receiving Much.

The city is at present doing a large amount of street work, all of it of the permanent variety. East Third street, from Church to Chestnut street, is being torn up preparatory to paving this thoroughfare with Belgian blocks. Chestnut street, near Bailey Brothers' factory, has been repaired by laying Belgian blocks and much new sidewalk is being placed in various sections of the city, notably on Spruce street, between Fifth and Sixth.
