COMPANY \$30,000,000 CAPITAL.

Thomas F. Ryan and Others to Take Over Coal Fields in Virginia.

NEW YORK, June 8.—Blair & Co., Thomas F. Ryan, Ludenham, Thalman & Co., and Norman B. Ream and their friends have under formation a \$30,000,000 coal and land company.

The deal contemplates the taking over of the Clinchfield Company, coal properties, about 200,000 acres of bituminous lands, in addition to a railroad extending to North Carolina.

The Seaboard Air Line, which is controlled by the Blair-Ryan interests, will enter into the deal in some way so as not to conflict with the provisions of the rate bill.

The financing of the proposition will involve the underwriting of probably \$20,000,000 of securities. It is reported that \$15,000,000 of notes will be issued, and that there will be \$5,000,000 of common and preferred stock, equally divided.

The Clinchfield property consists of about 118,000 acres of bituminous coal lands along the Norfolk & Western Railroad in Virginia. The Clinchfield corporation also owns a controlling interest in the South & Western Railway. This corporation was dissolved in 1905 and the assets of the company passed into the control of Messrs. Ryan, Blair, Dennis, Ream and Coolidge, all prominent in the affairs of the Seaboard Air Line.

260 MARRIAGE LICENSES.

That Number Have Been Issued By Forsyth's Register of Deeds This Year—What That Star Opposite the Groom's Name Signifies.

So far this year Register Lindsay has issued 260 marriage licenses, which shows an increase in the number over the corresponding period of 1906. June is generally a pretty good month for the marrying business, though Clerk McKaughan says there have been distressingly few of them so far this month. Along about Christmas is the most appropriate time, or at least, most people think so, for the records show that more marriage permits are issued in December than in any other two months of the year.

In looking over the marriage register one often asks why that star is placed just opposite some of the groom's names. Some folks think that these stars indicate that the marriage permits were issued on credit, while others think that maybe Mr. McKaughan, who, by the way, never has got his license yet, was more or less interested in that couple or one of them at least. John S. Huyler, Wealthy Candy Manufacturer, to Be Host at Montreat.

Prominent Presbyterians to the number of fifty or a hundred will assemble at Montreat the last of this month and be the guests of John S. Huyler from June 29th to July 4th inclusive.

It is known that fifty invitations have been sent by Mr. Huyler and as he expects the various committees of the Southern Presbyterian church concerned in the matter to attend it is quite probable that the guest list will reach a hundred.

Mr. Huyler will be the host in every sense of the word. He will pay all expenses and from the time the ones invited reach the railway station of their homes they will be at no expense. Mr. Huyler insists on paying their railroad fares both ways in addition to providing a delightful entertainment at his beautiful Montreat, which before many months is to pass from his ownership to that of the Presbyterian Church, South.

The guests will include Presbyterian ministers, editors of religious papers and representative men of the church, and the object relates to the purchase of Montreat. As is known, the Presbyterian Synod of North Carolina approved the plan of Dr. Howerton of Charlotte, to buy Montreat, and make it place of religious meetings as well as the summer home of Presbyterians. The plan adopted provides that five hundred persons should each contribute one hundred dollars and in return receive one lot for a home. No one is to be allowed to hold more than one share so that a colony of five hundred families will be provided.
