Prominent Americans in The Phillipines Are Murdered By The Natives.

Acting Governor of Davao in Island of Mindanao And a Prominent Planter Both Killed—Americans in Neighborhood Banded Together for Mutual Protection as Religious War by Moros is Feared.

By Wire to The Sentinel. MANILA, June 14.—News was received today of the murder of Edward C. Bolton, 17th infantry, acting governor of Davao, island of Mindanao, Chief Mungalaon and two brothers are accused of the crime.

American planters in Mindanao are concentrating for common safety as they fear the Moros are planning a religious war.

Durham Man Attempts Suicide.

RICHMOND, Va., June 12.—Out of work, money and a stranger in Richmond, James Kendrick, of Durham, N. C., evidently of good family and who knows a number of prominent Richmond ministers, took bicarbonate of mercury tablets this morning and would have died but for the work of Dr. Hodgins, of the ambulance corps.

Kendrick was picked up on the street as a suspicious character and, shortly after being locked up, was taken with convulsions. The ambulance responded promptly to the call and Dr. Hodgins, with his stomach pump, saved the man's life.

This afternoon Dr. Hodgins said the man's nerves were shattered, probably from exposure and drinking. The man came here from Washington to look for work. He refuses to talk about himself except to say that he is personally acquainted with a number of prominent ministers here.

WEALTHY MAN'S SON PROBABLY KIDNAPPED.
