
A. H. Eller went to Raleigh today.

P. T. Wilson returned this morning from a trip to New York. He attended the T. P. A. convention at Buffalo last week.


Mrs. R. A. Moore and child have returned from a month's stay at Toccoville, Mrs. Moore, who has been quite ill, is improved.

KILLED A MAN IN MAINE.

Then Fled to California and Lived Forty Years Under Assumed Name.
Walter Marvin Lancaster has carried his secret with him to the grave. He lived for nearly forty years in Bear Valley, this county, under the name of John Lang, and nobody guessed that it was assumed until the facts came to light after his death. He blew his brains out.

The inquest determined that Lang was not the correct name of the deceased. A witness stated that short time ago Lang told him that in case anything should happen he wanted it known that his true name was Walter Marvin Lancaster, and that he was a native of Maine. Lancaster further said that he had killed a man in Maine many years ago, but had been acquitted. Fearing that the dead man's friends would take his life, however, he said he had fled his home and changed his name to John Lang.

It was under that name he located in Bear Valley, set out a little orchard and built him a cozy home. He was highly regarded by all his neighbors, with whom he was on very friendly terms, though of his past life none of them had the slightest inkling. For years he conducted the Culbertson all bridge at his home, but after it went out of commission like many others he still clung to the valley and seemed content to spend his days here. He was a man of gigantic build.—Sacramento Bee.

PICTURE OF BOMB HORROR.
Spanish Paper Reproduces Photograph Taken at Time of Attempt to Kill Alfonso.
From Madrid Dispatch.

A remarkable photograph taken at the moment of the attempt to kill Alfonso and his bride appears in the current number of the illustrated journal, A. B. C. It gives a far more vivid picture of the occurrence than it is possible to deduce from confused and conflicting narratives.

In the middle of the road is the king's carriage with the coachman still on the box. To the right is a dense fog of dust, from the middle of which emerge the figures of three mounted soldiers, one apparently headless, and another with his arm upraised.

In front of the carriage one horse is lying dead, and the other seven are spread out across the street in a panic. The leading outsider is wildly galloping, while a civilian has just seized the head of the other leader.

On the left are the horses of the escort rearing and fringing, and mixed in the utmost confusion. To the right of the foreground is a dense crowd.

A soldier in the front is presenting his rifle beyond, while a policeman stands with his arms extended wide toward the carriage. Between him and the carriage are two blurred figures staggering in the fog of dust.

On the left side of the picture is an officer on a white horse apparently addressing the king or receiving orders.

VICTIM OF BIGAMIST.
"Lord Douglas," Alias Cavendish, Disappeared After Marrying Girl.

ASHEVILLE, June 18.—A letter was received from F. P. Hood, of New Iberia, Saturday, identifying the photograph of "Lord Douglas," alias John C. Cavendish, alias Duncan, as the John C. Cavendish who married Miss Josephine Hood, of this city, in New Iberia, December 16 last, and whose whereabouts have been a mystery since the day of her marriage.

Many incidents connected with Miss Hood's marriage are similar to the marriages of some half dozen or more women in Fort Worth, Tex.; Hot Springs, Ark.; Denver, Col., and Virginia, who, it is claimed, married the alleged English lord.

Although Miss Hood's family won't accept the theory that the Asheville girl married the bigamist, letters in possession of the police authorities warrant them in believing that the man married by Miss Hood is the original "Lord Douglas."
