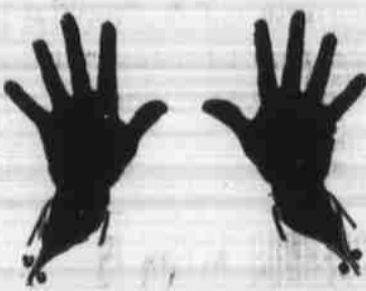

ANGIER DUKE HURT IN AUTO ACCIDENT

A Durham special to the Daily Industrial News says:

J. Ed Stagg, private secretary to R. N. Duke, talked with Mr. Duke over the long-distance phone today regarding the condition of Angier B. Duke, who was badly hurt in an automobile accident Saturday. Mr. Duke told Mr. Stagg that the first reports of the injuries received by his son were greatly exaggerated. He said that his son was painfully hurt but that his condition was not so serious as indicated. He hopes to be out again in a few days.

Mr. Duke was hurt on Long Island, in company with his sister, Miss Mary Duke, and Miss Fuller, daughter of W. W. Fuller, chief counsel for the American Tobacco Company, and the chauffeur, they started for a ride and were following a lumber wagon that would not give way. In trying to get around the wagon the machine occupied by Mr. Duke skidded and struck the wagon full force. Mr. Duke was thrown on top of the load of lumber and taken to a hospital to be treated. He was bruised about the head and face.

About Christmas time, Mr. Duke narrowly escaped death while at Carret Lodge, in the eastern part of the State, with a party of friends. He was in a boat with a young lady who lives here and while handling his gun it fired prematurely and Mr. Duke lost a hand. He was not long in the hospital, however, and now he has received a second hurt within six months.

With his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. B. N. Duke, and his sister, Miss Mary Duke, the young man left here a little more than two weeks ago for New York, intending a tour of the New England States in an automobile.

Message From New Iberia, La., Says She Has Been Found, But Gives No Details—Woman in Santa Anna Not the Victim of "Lord Douglas."

ASHEVILLE, June 25.—Telegrams received here from Santa Anna, Cal., state that the woman deserted by her husband in that city is not Miss Josephine Hood, the latest victim of J. C. Cavendish, the bogus "Lord Douglas." Another message from New Iberia, La., signed by Edwin Hood, brother of the missing girl, states that his sister has been located, and asks that "picture be forwarded for confirmation." No other details were given, but efforts are now being made by telegraph to obtain further information.
