"DR." WHITE TO MAKE PIES.

Government Returns \$12,900 to the Convicted Oculist.

BALTIMORE, June 26.—It is likely that "Dr." Thomas H. White, who on Saturday was sentenced to serve three years in the penitentiary and to pay a fine of \$1,500 for using the mails in furtherance of a scheme to defraud will spend his term making pies for the inmates of the prison. Warden Weyer is thinking about assigning the dealer in the oculist to the prosaic pie foundry. The doctor's prison number is 17858.

The \$12,900.50 in cash captured at the "doctor's" "College of Science," when it was raided at the time of his arrest, has been returned to him, as the government could not confiscate it. Since the arrest 13,500 letters addressed to the doctor have been received at the postoffice, showing the enormous extent of his business. In 2,500 of these letters were postal money orders for sums ranging from \$1 to \$7. This money was, of course, returned to the senders.

WAS IT ED DAVIS?

Negro Killed in Danville Reported To Have Been Slayer of Conductor Wiggins.

A message received in Salisbury yesterday from Danville says that while attempting to burglarize a Danville residence Monday night Ed. Davis, a negro, was shot and killed and Monroe Richardson, another negro, and Davis' companion in crime, was captured by officers. The Post says that Richardson, after his arrest, stated that the dead man was the Ed. Davis who killed Conductor W. A. Wiggins on his car in Salisbury in April. Richardson said he was on the car with Davis and remained in his seat when Davis fired the shot that caused Mr. Wiggins' death.
