STATE DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION NOTES.

The Democratic State convention, held at Greensboro, adjourned at 11:15 Tuesday night. At the afternoon session Franklin McNeill was renominated by a large majority for corporation commissioner. The nominees for superior court judges were endorsed.

Ex-Gov. C. B. Aycock, permanent chairman, made a stirring speech. He said:

"The Democratic party stands for altruism and unselfishness. It is the boast of the Democratic party that it makes men honest. We do not have to run down morals for the Democratic party does not foster them."

"The Republican party boasts that it has ousted wrong-doers here and there, but what have they done with the insurance companies. For 60 years we had no scandals. The honesty of the people is worth more than all of the accumulated wealth of this country."

"If you do not think the Republican party is dirty you ask the Blackburn wing what it thinks of the Adams wing! Then, ask the Adams wing what it thinks of the Blackburn wing!"

A resolution was adopted endorsing Bryan for president and C. B. Aycock for vice-president.

At the night session of the convention the platform, which was read by Senator Simmons, pledged the democracy to the preservation of Jeffersonian principles and endorsed the administration of Governor Glenn. The Waits and Ward bills regulating the liquor traffic were approved and endorsed. The improvement of educational conditions in the State was promised. It recommended the enlargement of the powers of corporation commissioners and the material reduction of freight rates in the State. The discrimination of railroads against North Carolina cities and towns was condemned. The interference of great corporations in political matters was denounced. The Appalachian Forest Reserve Bill was endorsed. Subsidies, gratuities, trusts, and monopolies were denounced in no uncertain terms. Republican anti-trust legislation was described as hypocritical. Insurance corruption was roundly scored. The protective tariff was designated as a trust breeder and its revision was demanded. At the conclusion of the reading of the platform Mr. J. D. Murphy's amendment providing that the corporation-commissioners be empowered to regulate telephone rates and schedules was adopted unanimously.
