PROBABLY NO JOINT DEBATE IN "DE ATE"

The Sentinel published a report a few days ago to the effect that the Republican congressional committee of the eighth district had voted against a joint canvass. Mr. R. N. Hackett, the Democratic nominee, last week sent a challenge to Mr. Blackburn, asking him to participate in a joint canvass of the district. The Republican candidate replies that he has referred Mr. Hackett's letter to the chairman of the Republican committee, who is Mr. Chas. H. Cowles, of Wilkesboro. This is taken to mean that the challenge will not be accepted.

"If Blackburn loses out in his fight for the state chairmanship I'm afraid Hackett will defeat him," said one of Spencer's admirers this morning. He added that the appointment of Bob Douglas as postmaster at Greensboro was evidence that President Roosevelt is still against the congressman now representing the eighth district.

Mr. Hackett's Challenge.

WILKESBORO, July 7.—The following is a copy of a letter which was today mailed to Hon. E. Spencer Blackburn at Greensboro:

Hon. E. Spencer Blackburn, Greensboro, N. C.

Dear Sir: It is a time-honored custom and worthy of continuation that opposing candidates of the different political parties for the same legislative position should make a joint canvass of their respective counties or districts, so that the voters may have an opportunity of hearing a discussion of both sides of any question on which the parties are divided, and also of judging of comparison which of the candidates, in their opinion, is most worthy of their suffrages, which would serve them with most fidelity, honesty and ability in a representative capacity and would most effectually safeguard the interests of the people. Since you have been nominated by the Republican party of the eighth congressional district as its candidate for representative in the national Congress, I, as the candidate of the Democratic party for the same position, invite you to meet me in joint discussion throughout the various counties of the district at such times and places as we may hereafter agree upon. Trusting that this invitation will meet with your favorable consideration and that you will write me at your earliest convenience suggesting when and where we shall meet and arrange for said joint canvass. Textile Education.

The A. & M. College at Raleigh has begun for distribution an attractive pamphlet describing the textile courses. The history of the department is one which shows solid, substantial growth from the smallest beginnings to the best equipment for teaching textile industry. In 1900 it had only one instructor and three students, with an equipment consisting of one spinning frame and two looms. The machinery was located in the basement of the main building, without any power to run it. Since that time the department has developed until now there are four instructors, 37 students, and the equipment which is valued at \$50,000 is located in a special textile building, which cost \$25,000. All makes of cotton mill machinery are included, and the equipment is regarded as one of the best in the country for instruction in cotton manufacture. Professor Thomas Nelson is head of the department.

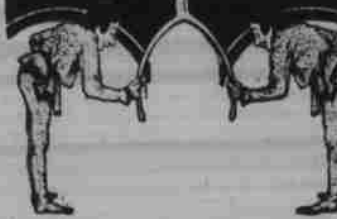

SOME FIGURES ON IMMIGRATION.

1,027,421 Immigrants Came To This Country During the Fiscal Year Ending June 30—More Came From Austria-Hungary Than From Any Other Country.

The following about immigration was contained in yesterday's Charlotte Observer:

It is stated that for the fiscal year ended June 30, 850,000 immigrants were landed in New York breaking all records. The previous year 758,298 aliens passed through Ellis Island to make their home in this country. The total number of arrivals of immigrants at all ports in the United States during the fiscal year 1905 was 1,027,421. The previous high figure was in 1904, when the total number was 857,946. During 1905 275,639 immigrants came from Austria-Hungary. Italy dropped to second place for the first time in six years, the total from that country having been 221,479. Russia came third with 184,897; while Great Britain was fourth with 137,957. The Scandinavians...
