The Lincoln Republican Club, of New Hampshire, headed by Prof. Jas. F. Colby, of Dartmouth College, and Bishop William W. Niles, of the Protestant Episcopal Diocese of New Hampshire, has asked Winston Churchill, of Cornish, the novelist, to become a candidate for the Republican gubernatorial nomination on the issue of reform in the party, and he has accepted.

"During the two sessions in which I have been in the Legislature," he said in his letter of acceptance, "I have had an opportunity to study the political system by which this State is wrongfully controlled, and I take the liberty of suggesting that the broad issue and general platform should be the non-interference of the Boston and Maine Railroad or any other corporation in the politics and government of the State."
