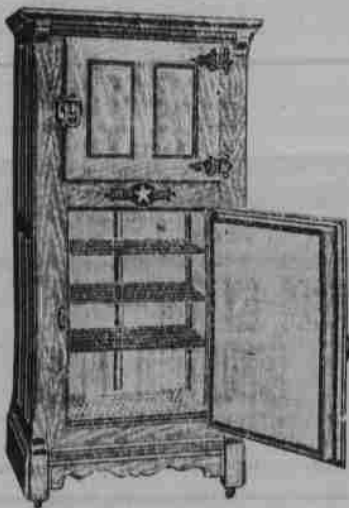

# SOUTHERN CONFERENCE ABOUT IRRIGATION

In view of the general interest that  
exists throughout the South in regard  
to immigration for this section, the  
matter of holding another meeting of  
the Southern Immigration and Quar-  
antine Conference has been taken up by  
the Tradesman, with Gov. John I.  
Cox, of Tennessee, who was made  
permanent chairman of the Cham-  
paign conference, and Gov. R. B.  
Glen, of North Carolina, on whose  
motion the conference was made a  
permanent organization.

Both of these governors strongly  
approve of the holding of a second  
meeting this fall, and Nashville is  
given as the place for its assembling,  
owing to the facilities that Gov. Cox  
will have for closer co-operation there  
with those who will take active charge  
of arranging for the conference than  
he could do elsewhere.

Expressions have been given by a  
number of others interested in this  
movement and the opinion is uniform  
that there could not be a more oppor-  
tune time for such a conference than  
this fall will be. It is universally  
conceded that the national quarantine  
law, passed by the recent congress,  
was in direct response to the demand  
therefor created by the Chattanooga  
meeting and these are matters that a  
second conference can settle for the  
South of equal importance to this one  
of quarantine.

Among these matters, one of taking  
labor from one state to another  
by labor agents is becoming the  
source of great demoralization to  
labor itself and entailing expensive  
burdens on employers, with even fric-  
tion between state authorities where  
the laws of different states are in con-  
flict regarding the enticing of labo-  
rers away from employers. There  
should be uniform policies on this im-  
portant matter, and this will doubt-  
less form one subject that will en-  
gage the attention of the conference.

In this direction a prominent cotton  
mill man has said that as high as one-  
third of the cotton mill labor of the  
Carolinas was more or less constantly  
on the cars, going from one plant to  
another, and from one state to another  
and that if the practice could be stop-  
ped there would not be so much com-  
plaint among the cotton mill men  
about their labor.

But the whole subject of immigra-  
tion and labor can be profitably con-  
sidered by such a conference and the  
meeting will unquestionably be gen-  
erally hailed as timely and will be  
largely attended.

# COTTON STALK PRODUCTS PLAN

In the last issue of The Tradesman,  
there was an editorial in reference to  
the Cotton Stalk Products Company  
that had been recently organized  
under the laws of Maine with an an-  
nounced capital of \$15,000,000.  
It was reported in a reliable New  
York paper, and extensively copied by  
the Southern press, as coming from  
the president of the new company,  
that "several plants would be erected  
and in successful operation by Janu-  
ary 1, 1907," and the marvelous  
results that were to follow from the  
operation of these plants were such  
that we felt impelled to dub them as  
being worthy of having emanated  
from the fertile brain of a Colonel  
Mulberry Sellers.

We know that no plant for making  
paper from cotton stalks had ever  
been operated to test the commercial  
value of the enterprise, and the only  
object of our publication was to have  
those who had made these claims de-  
monstrate their correctness, before  
entailing such losses in experiments  
as had occurred elsewhere, and under  
the same patents that this latter com-  
pany were reported as intending to use.

For the information of all interested  
we give below a report made by a  
competent chemist to the Little Rock  
Board of Trade on the practicability  
of such an enterprise:

To the Members of the Board of  
Trade, Little Rock, Ark.:  
I notice considerable comment in  
the press regarding the Cotton Stalk  
Products Company, of which Harvie  
Jordan is president, and would state  
to you that paper stock cannot be  
made from the cotton plant, either  
stalk or bolls; that is, the high-grade  
paper stock cannot be manufactured  
from the stalk or bolls, but a cheap  
grade can be made, but not at a profit.
