MISS DOREE ALLEGES FALSE ARREST BY WASHINGTON POLICEMEN AT THE INSTANCE OF PRESIDENT'S PRIVATE SECRETARY.—CASE MAY BE CALLED FOR TRIAL IN OCTOBER.

RAFFERTY ARRESTED BUT LATER RELEASED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—When interviewed behind the bars at the Seventh street police station this morning where he is held charged with passing worthless checks, Geo. E. Rafferty, son of Gilbert Rafferty, Sr., the "snake king" in Pittsburg, denied that his father has alienated his affections from Mrs. Geo. Rafferty, who recently sued her father-in-law for \$500,000 damages. Rafferty attributes his present predicament to a spree at Fort Myer, Va., where he went to visit his old comrades who served with him in the Philippines. His funds ran low and he worked off two worthless checks for small amounts.

RURAL ROBBERIES NEAR MOSCOW NOW

MOSCOW, Russia, Aug. 10.—Unsettled conditions of affairs following attempts to start fresh revolution and calling of troops generally into the city to prevent any uprising has given great opportunity to lawless element to indulge in all sorts of depredations. A virtual reign of anarchy prevails in districts surrounding this city and inhabitants are terror-stricken. Armed robbers infest the country and operate. Unchecked excesses of all kinds have been committed by these robbers. No one feels safe from attacks and there is nothing sacred in their eyes. Even churches have been desecrated and pillaged. Numerous murderous attacks have been made on inoffensive persons who get in the way of the robbers. It is also reported that many of the robbers have cycles, which makes it easy for them to move rapidly from place to place.

The groom is a prominent farmer of Rockingham county, and the young people have the best wishes of a host of friends for a long and happy married life."

CHANGES IN FREIGHT CLASSIFICATIONS MADE

RALEIGH, Aug. 10.—The corporation commission announced today several changes in the classification of freight extensively shipped in North Carolina. The classification of tobacco baskets is changed from third class to class A, a reduction of about 50 per cent in the rate. The rate on delivery and freight wagons is changed from one and a half times first-class to first-class, a reduction of about 50 per cent. A change is also ordered in the classification of mfrs. in our load lots. This change is from second to third class, a reduction of about 15 per cent.

NEW RAILROAD GETS A CHARTER

RALEIGH, Aug. 10.—The Carolina Mineral Railroad Co. was chartered today for the purpose of constructing and operating a railroad from Charlotte to Lancaster, S. C., traversing Mecklenburg and Union counties in this State and Lancaster county in South Carolina. The road is to be forty miles in length, thirty-five miles of being in North Carolina. The road will run by the property of the Colossus Gold Mining and Milling Company in Union county. The incorporators are J. F. Kelley, J. A. Ripple, D. H. Culp, P. W. Baker, J. G. Epp and others, of Pennsylvania, and A. H. Moore, of Waxhaw.

TRIP IN INTEREST OF SOUTHBOUND RAILWAY

Mr. H. E. Fries went to Washington City last night to confer with the head officials of the Southern Railway in regard to securing rights-of-way for the Southbound Railroad to cross the tracks of the Southern at the lower end of the yard here. It was the intention of the Southbound Company at first to run under the Southern tracks, but by a change in the grade it became necessary to go over the tracks. Mr. Fries says that his company has men all along the line of the Southbound securing the rights-of-way. They are making rather slow progress, caused by many land owners wanting to charge exorbitant prices. As soon as these matters are adjusted the men behind it propose to push the construction work as rapidly as possible.
