REVENUE RAIDS IN IREDELL.
 Officers Capture Two Plants.—Assault on Negro Driver.

 Field Deputy Shepherd and Deputy Marshal Scroggins, of the internal revenue service, and Sheriff Summers made a raid on a blockade distillery, near Prospect church, in New Hope township, early Tuesday morning, while the moon was still shining, and captured one copper still and a quantity of beer and low wines. Some one had notified the operators that officers were coming and one still and other supplies and products had been removed.

While the officers were at the still Will Wasson, colored, one of Mr. W. R. Mills' drivers, was asleep in the carriage some distance away. Sheriff Summers feared that the negro would have some trouble and left a gun with him. As Will slept one of the interested natives of that section made an attack on him. Will seized upon some rocks and succeeded in running the man away, forgetting that a gun had been left with him for defence.

As Messrs. Shepherd and Scroggins were returning to Statesville they noticed a suspicious road, and following it came upon a big steam plant near New Hope postoffice. There was only one man at the still, M. Lloyd Marlow, and he was captured along with the whole outfit, boiler, stills, a quantity of beer, etc.
 Marlow had a hearing before United States Commissioner Cowles and was bound over to court. Marlow claims that he has no interest in the distillery, that he was working there a while for what whiskey he could get. The bond was \$300, and failing to find sureties Marlow went to jail.
