Melvor as president of the State Normal and Industrial College the list of trustees of the institution on whom will devolve the duty of electing the new president will be of special interest. They are as follows: First congressional district, D. T. McMillen, Elizabeth City; second district, A. J. Connor, of Rich Square; third district, B. F. Aycock, Fremont; fourth district, R. T. Gray, Raleigh; fifth district, S. M. Gantt, Hillsboro; sixth district, Col. Walker Taylor, Wilmington; seventh district, T. B. Bailey, eighth district, J. L. Nelson, Lenoir; ninth district, C. H. Melbane, Newton; tenth district, J. D. Murphy, Asheville. State Superintendent of Public Instruction J. J. Joyner, who is most prominently mentioned for the presidency, is chairman of the board.
